On May 15, 1891, the Fifty-Eighth General Assembly of the State of Delaware passed "an Act to Establish and Maintain a College for the Education of 'Colored' students in Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts. By virtue of the Second Morrill Act of Congress (in 1890) there was provided a permanent annual endowment of twenty-five thousand dollars for each land-grant college established under the provisions of the Morrill Act of 1862 and allowed a portion of the federal appropriation to be used for the endowment, support and maintenance of land-grant colleges for Negro youths in states which maintained separate educational facilities. It was this legislation which provided for the "beginning" of Delaware State College.

The dedication and commitment of several administrative "bodies" has produced D.S.C. today—a progressive liberal arts institution of higher learning which is striving for Excellence. Heading the "totem pole" of administrative hierarchy is a select group called the Board of Trustees. This group is comprised of eleven members—six appointed by the Governor of Delaware and five elected by the Trustees. The President of the college is a voting member of the Board.

In Memoriam

John Howell was born on February 25, 1921 in Cherryville, North Carolina, the second of ten children—and the son of The Reverend Fred and Mrs. Gertrude Howell. He died suddenly on March 19, 1988 in Dover, Delaware. After serving in World War II, Mr. Howell finished his education at Hampton Institute, graduating with a Bachelor of Science Degree in 1947. His pursuit for education did not stop there In 1952 he received his Master of Science Degree from Michigan State University and later enrolled as a doctoral candidate at Oregon State University, where he completed his course work, and also served as a County Agent in the Cooperative Extension Service while going to school.

Professional organizations that Mr. Howell belonged to include American Horticultural Society, American Vocational Association, Wintherthur Museum and Gardens, National Trust for Historic Preservation, Pennsylvania Horticultural Society and The Franklin Mint Collectors Society. Mr. Howell was a member and Trustee of Union Baptist Church. He had also taught Sunday School. Mr. Howell's career in education began as a teacher in agriculture in the public schools of North Carolina. After receiving his Masters Degree, he joined the faculty at Delaware State College in September 1952 as a teacher in the Department of Agriculture, and at the time of his death was an Associate Professor in the Department.

Mr. Howell will be remembered by those who knew him best as a strong believer in vocational agriculture with an emphasis on practical application of his subject matter. He will be remembered as a "real gentleman" with a genuine interest in his students.




A Bag of Tools


HORNETS DEFEAT THE AGGIES

This was the case as the Delaware State Football Hornets pooled their resources enroute to a 41-9 thrashing of North Carolina A&T before a homecoming crowd of 7,522. The win over the Aggies avenged last years heartbreaking loss that cost the Hornets the conference Championship and the automatic NCAA play-off bid that came with it. The Hornet offense thoroughly showcased their talents as they accumulated a healthy 556 yards of total offense, (75 passing, 322 rushing, 149 return) and had the crowd believing that perhaps the Hornets were invincible after all. Pat Casey, Terrance Hoover, and John Lane ran for two yard touchdowns, and Dave Parkinson added a field goal to make the score 27-0 at the half. Reggie Barnes stunned the Aggie defense with a 44 yard touchdown run, ecstacy with a 79 yard punt return that left the Aggies numb with disbelief. 
Dr. William M. Freeman celebrated Founders Day with the Delaware State College family. The program took place on February 7, 1988 in the EH theatre with general public invited.


Dr. Freeman, a graduate of Delaware State College, is currently a member of North Carolina House of Representatives.


