Patricia Russell McCloud Keeps the Dream Alive Keeping the dream alive

LA black martyr's dream of peace and love serve as medicine for a nation now plagued by the infirmities of war and hate.

Throughout his life Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. stood for what he believed in. On April 4th, 1968 Dr. King fell victim to an assassin's bullet for what he believed in.

Today, pioneering blacks like Patricia Russell-McCloud, Esquire, work to make Dr. King's dream a reality. During a January 15th program in celebration of King's life, Russell-McCloud delivered a powerful speech to the Delaware State College family.

Russell-McCloud challenged listeners to realize and work towards their full potentials. "I dare us to recognize that there is no monopoly on excellence... If you want a thing bad enough, go out and fight for it.... sweat for it."

Dr. King had a special vision said Russell-McCloud. "He saw stumbling blocks and turned them into stepping stones." Today's black youth must confront stumbling blocks and treat them as King did indicated Russell-McCloud.

If the stumbling blocks should tower above as a mountain, Russell-McCloud commanded the audience to step back and say, "Mountain, get out of my way!"

Russell-McCloud was, indeed, a convincing lecturer. She skillfully linked King's prophetic language to the present struggle for civil rights and world order. "Let freedom ring from Montgomery to Memphis, from

Delaware to Desert Shield!"

Russell-McCloud was not, however, speaking in support of the American war effort. She, in fact, criticized the suspicious timing of the January 15th United Nations deadline saying, "we are celebrating the birthday of a peacekeeper on the D-day of a countdown."

Two decades after King's death, a sad reality is evident. Many black youths feel that the struggle for rights and dignity has accomplished its goals. As a sophomore student agrees. "Some people think that everything is equal, but there is still (much) prejudice in the world," she said.

Although the present generation rarely experiences the open racism that drove their forefathers to demonstrate and lobby for change, Russell-McCloud indicated that racism is alive and well. "Things are different and yet the same. Things are the same and yet different," she reasoned. "Take a glance down the archives of time."

"If children are ignorant of their

history, they won't know where they are going," said Russell-McCloud. Any leader may lead them anywhere. "Everything marked for us is not for us. You have to know who you are following and where they are going."

Russell-McCloud, a graduate of Howard University's School of Law and Kentucky State University, stressed that education is the key to success. "Education is like American Express," she said. "You don't dare leave home without it."

Viola Seth, a nursing major, praised Russell-McCloud's message. "In the three years that I've attended D.S.C.'s tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. I personally feel that Ms. Patricia Russell-McCloud was the best speaker," she said.

Other speakers included President William B. Delauder, Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Henry N. Tisdale, and The Reverend Rudolph Coleman. Joyous music was rendered by Ms. Caroline Gibson, Ms. Mabel Morrison and the Gospel Choir. As the program closed, the audience stood, held hands and sang "We Shall Overcome".

Patricia Russell-McCloud said the answer is on us. Yesterday is a cancelled check, tomorrow is a promissory note, but today is cash in hand. With positive role models like Russell-McCloud, we shall, indeed, overcome all adversities.

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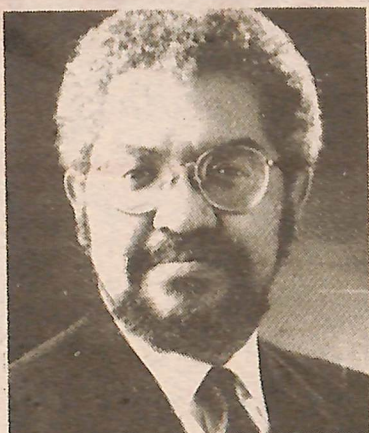
Why Blacks Feel Threatened

Several days ago, a Philadelphia newspaper editor suggested that Black welfare mothers should be "encouraged" to stop reproducing sexually, by implanting in their arms the new, five-year birth control device. To many African-Americans, this was yet one more indication that the Black community was under attack, targeted by a new, more sophisticated form of white racism.

In politics, the Bush administration ignored the advice of prominent Black Republicans such as former Secretary of Transportation William T. Coleman and Secretary of Health and Human Services Louis Sullivan by vetoing the 1990 Civil Rights Bill. The excuse given by Bush, that the legislation made it too difficult for employers to defend themselves against charges of racism, in effect appealed to the white supremacist wing of the Republican party. On this issue, Bush was closer to David Duke than the majority of Americans.

The ink on the vetoed bill was barely dry before the next racial controversy, the new policy which would deny Federal funds to colleges which awarded scholarships to minority students on the basis of race. Black and Latino educators pointed out that colleges had allocated special scholarships for decades to athletes and others with special skills. Nearly all scholarships



for minority students were not based narrowly on race, but on economic need as well as other important criteria. The sharp reaction against this new policy forced Bush into a quick turnabout, declaring that scholarships specifically for racial minorities could be drawn from private funds. But in effect, the entire episode implied that Blacks, Hispanics and other people of color should be excluded from higher education.

For African-Americans, these two incidents seemed to symbolize the end of an entire historical period, the Civil Rights Movement for democracy in America. For many years, a sense of optimism and hope pervaded Black politics. The movement from racial segregation to full participation within the American mainstream was taken for granted. Now, all the evidence points to a deterioration in the economic and social status of Blacks in American life, and the Bush administration seems willing to push minorities over the abyss.

For example, in terms of health care, an alarming gap has been created between African-Americans and whites. According to the National Center for Health Statistics,

the life expectancy for Black men has fallen to 64.9 years, below retirement age. Millions of Black women aren't receiving adequate prenatal care, and infant mortality rates are not surprisingly twice the rate for Blacks than whites. Another recent health study found that Blacks, who represent only 13 percent of the total U.S. population, now account for 80 percent of all premature deaths—because of abnormally high rates of pneumonia, asthma, bladder infections, and other diseases. Blacks, Hispanics and low income people die sooner than upper-class whites, because they have no access to regular healthcare services and because many have no health insurance.

Economically, the same picture of inequality emerges. The recent failure of Harlem's Freedom National Bank, one of the largest minority-owned financial institutions in the country, revealed the government was unwilling to bail out economically distressed institutions when they held Blacks' funds. As the recession deepens, the jobless rates in the Black community have soared, while the Bush administration does nothing.

What all these elements have in common is the phony concept of "reverse racism," that Blacks have been given too much over the years. The only way to reverse these trends is to rebuild the Black protest movement, to challenge the system which perpetuates inequality.

May I offer my solution to the problem of the dangerously depleted ozone layer.

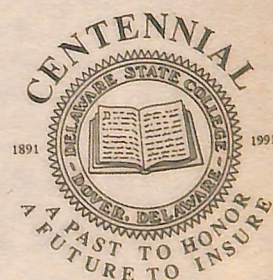
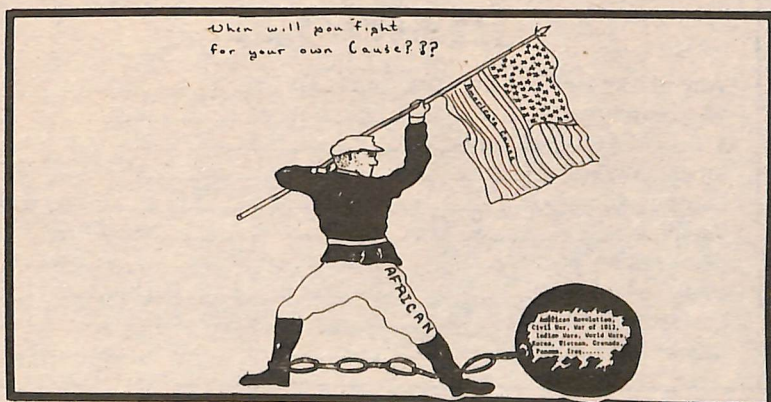
tained at its normal level after the initial restoration project by a minimal number of annual flights.

Campus Admissions Should Be Color-Blind, Students Believe

(CPS) — A majority of both black and white college students in the South believe campuses should be color-blind when admitting undergraduates, a new survey has found.

The two groups, however, disagree sharply over whether black students get special consideration from graduate schools, the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) study also found.

"The way students view racial issues on campus is still very unsettled," said Ansley A. Abraham, author of the report and research associate for the SREB, a group that addresses education issues for 15 southern states.

For the study, Abraham surveyed 5,000 students at 20 predominantly white and 20 historically black campuses in the Southeast.

About half of the black students felt "special consideration" should be given to blacks when they apply to graduate schools.

"I think we have gotten to the point both black and white students see possibility of going to college in the same way."

Only 15 percent of white students agreed.

"Black students still see (graduate school) as a mystical entity that very few (black students) make it into. White students view it as a natural progression," Abraham speculated.

It was different for undergraduate study. More than 75 percent of the students, both black and white, agreed that every student "should meet the same academic standards for admissions" to undergraduate programs.

"I think we have gotten to the point when both black and white students see the possibility of going to college in the same way," Abraham said.

The study also found that when students are a minority on campus, whatever their race, they share perceptions about campus climate.

Both white students on historically black campuses and black students on predominantly white campuses said they didn't think their schools gave them enough opportunity to express their concerns and to relate their experiences on campus.

"The faculty is not willing to help us as they are to help out (white) counterparts. This school is becoming more and more integrated but this isn't the will of the overall school," wrote a black student who attends a predominantly white school.

Many of the students surveyed also expressed concern over their institutions' efforts to recruit minority students, faculty and administrators.

A study released last January by the American Council on Education found that, despite greater recruiting efforts, the number of black students seeking higher education has dropped steadily since 1976.

"Black students value the recruiting process differently. They seem to get more out of it," Abraham said.

But many of the students said they had not been given an accurate picture of what campus life would be like by recruiters, he added.

There's the Treat of War, But Iraqi Invasion Also Brings Cold Dorms

"Higher Oil Prices Another Mess For Strapped Colleges; Some Say It's 'Wonderful'"

(CPS) — Iraq's invasion of Kuwait and the resulting surge in the cost of oil have brought the world to the brink of war and pulled hundreds of collegians out of class to serve in the armed forces.

Now they're about to make this the coldest winter in years on many college campuses.

Many schools already are strictly following federal conservation guidelines, imposed immediately after the crisis began, to keep thermostats in classes, dorms and offices set anywhere from 65 degrees to 68 degrees.

"Some of the conference rooms are a little chilly," admitted University of Pennsylvania resident adviser Ira Gluck.

Penn has lowered the temperature in all its buildings by five degrees. Dorm rooms can't be warmer than 68 degrees. In other buildings, the limit is 65 degrees.

With the cost of oil rising from about \$20 per barrel before the invasion to its current price of about \$25 per barrel, colleges, many already in the middle of a budget nightmare brought on by a lack of state funding, have to figure out how to cover skyrocketing fuel costs.

"When you're paying \$20,000 a year it's hard to understand why it's cold in your dorm room," admitted Harvey Kaiser, a vice president at Syracuse University. It's important, he added, to get students to cooperate by turning out unnecessary lights

and keeping doors closed.

"We think oil is too cheap. Forty dollars a barrel would be just great."

Schools that use oil as the main source of heat, typically in the Northeast, have been hardest hit. Campuses heated with coal or natural gas haven't been affected as directly.

"It's wonderful," declared Kermit Lidstrom, president of Bismarck State College in North Dakota, one of the country's bigger oil producing states. "The more oil we produce, the more money goes to the state treasury and the more chance that we can get higher appropriations," Lidstrom explained.

Meanwhile, Bismarck, which is heated with natural gas, isn't affected. "We think oil is too cheap. Forty dollars a barrel would be just great."

But indirectly, oil prices reach all parts of the economy. Because of higher gasoline prices, transportation costs also have risen.

The petroleum-based products farmers need - fertilizer, agricultural chemicals, fuel and power - are now more expensive. Higher transportation costs also force food prices up.

An Extra \$10 Million

Philadelphia Thermal Energy, which heats the Penn campus, raised its rates by 15 percent during the fall. Penn's fuel bill consequently will be about \$2 million more than expected. Officials are hoping that lowering the heat and discouraging the use of alternate heat sources - such as space heaters - will save at least \$1 million.

Yet schools in general seem to have done a good job in learning to deal with sudden leaps in the price of oil.

Two previous energy crises in 1973 and 1979 sent campuses reeling. Expenses increased dramatically, while funding dropped. Colleges had to defer maintenance on buildings and put off professors'

raises. Tuition rose by more than 10 percent a year.

"On the whole," said Walter Schaw, head of the Virginia-based Association of Physical Plant Administrators of Universities and Colleges, "campuses are much less dependent on oil than even four or five years ago."

It was just a matter of time before it happened again, and we knew it."

"When you're paying \$20,000 a year it's hard to understand why it's cold in your dorm room."

"We aren't experiencing a big impact here," affirmed H.C. Lott, a vice president at the University of Texas-Austin which, like most other schools in the Southwest, relies mostly on natural gas.

Additionally, many campuses now have the capability to switch quickly among coal, oil and gas to provide their heat, depending on current market prices. Some schools also have made themselves independent of local utilities by building their own power plants.

But it can still hurt.

It's costing George Mason University in Washington, D.C., an extra \$480,000 to heat its campus this winter, despite lowering the heat to 65 degrees in its buildings.

The State University of New York system already was facing a \$51 million deficit when escalating oil prices left its 64 campuses with an extra \$10 million in heating bills.

Rutgers University in New Jersey anticipates spending \$21 million this school year for utilities costs, about \$4 million more than was allocated before the Aug. 2 Iraqi invasion of Kuwait.

"We're going to try some energy conservation measures and we'll cut back some other programs," said Dick Engle, assistant vice president for facilities of the four Rutgers campuses.

"Academics," Engle declared, "is the last thing we want to touch."

"It's something we've been through before, and we'll do it again."

Defying the Odds, College Enrollment Goes Up Again

(CPS)—The long-anticipated college student population decline still hasn't happened, a new campus head count found.

The number of students enrolled at two- and four-year campuses actually increased in 1990, with community colleges enjoying the biggest boom, said a report by the American Council on Education (ACE).

Though the U.S. Dept. of Education will release an "official" campus census later in the year, the ACE report typically has proven very accurate.

This year's version has some observers wondering whether a downturn in the number of high school seniors, which the Department of Education predicts will continue until 1995, will in fact cause the enrollment bust that campus officials have been fearing for years.

"Perhaps we will not see a slow-down" in the number of students seeking higher education, said ACE spokeswoman Kathy Ruser.

If it's happening, it hasn't happened here," agreed William Goldmann, dean of educational services at Pasadena City College (PCC) in California.

ACE's survey of institutions in 14 states found 2-to-6 percent increases in enrollment at community colleges during the last year. Four-year campuses posted increases between 1 percent and 3 percent.

he jumps may be due to the schools' success in attracting "non-traditional" students - those older than 24 years - and retaining current students, said Ruser.

Community colleges are doing well, Goldmann added, because their tuition costs are low and they offer a wide variety of classes.

The combination helped PCC increase its enrollment by at least 4 percent since 1989, he said.

Other two-year campuses like Muscatine, Minneapolis, Rainy River, Palm Beach and Salt Lake community colleges also reported enrollment gains this school year.

Even "smaller" four-year campuses like Mount Union and Franklin colleges, Southwest Missouri State, Nebraska Wesleyan, Ball State, Penn State at Edinboro, Middle Tennessee State and West Texas universities enrolled more students.

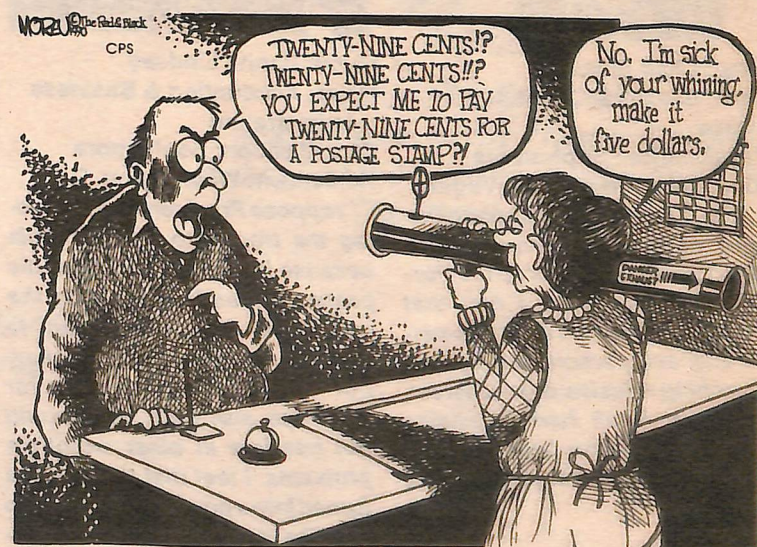
So did big systems like the universities of Wisconsin, Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut and New Mexico.

Yet more is not always better.

Colleges in Utah had to ask the state government for more funds last year after enrollment at the schools exceeded administrators' expectations.

Officials often have to open more course sections, hire more teachers and provide more services than planned when a surprising number of students registers for classes.

PCC is slowing its expansion of course offerings so the number of students does not overwhelm the school's budget, Goldmann said.

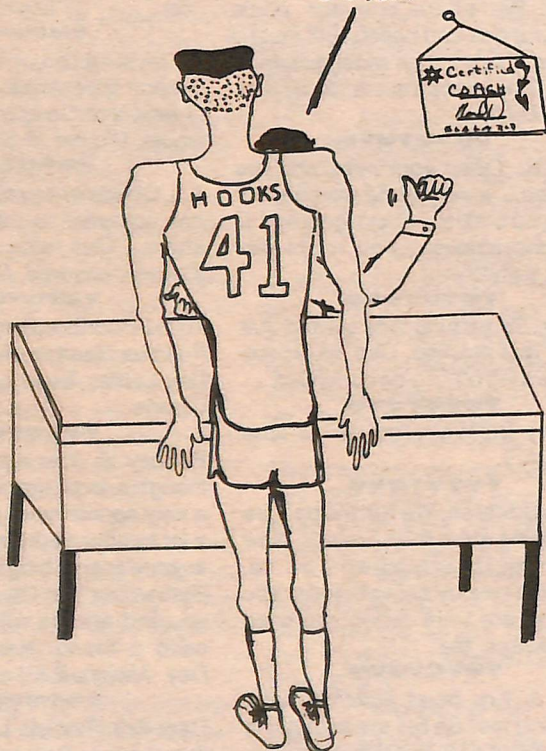

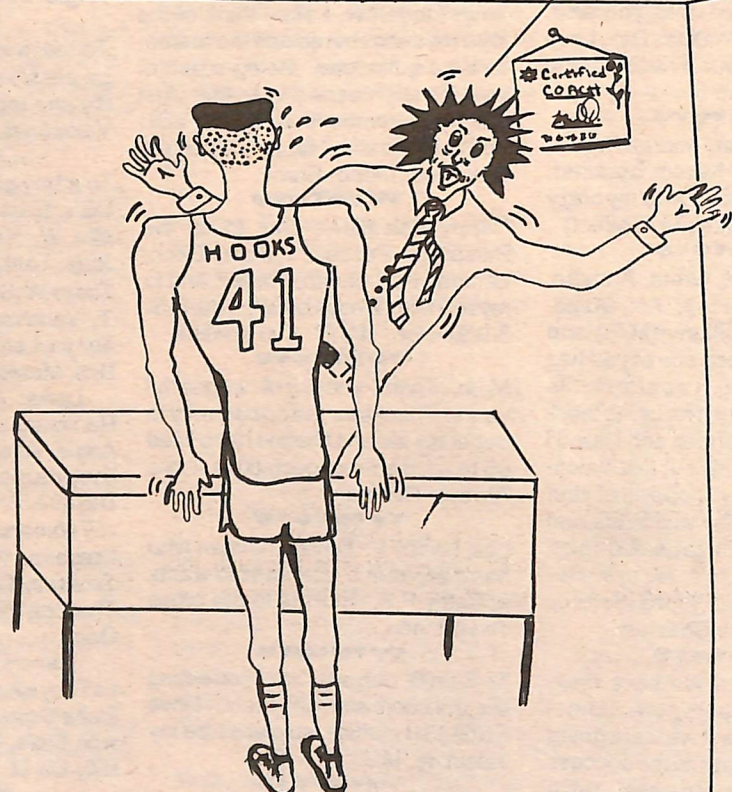

Football Wrap-Up

For the seventh time in eight years the Hornets have won seven or more games, while finishing third in the MEAC at 7-3. The Hornets capped their season with a 29-14 over rival Howard University.

As predicated in the preseason the Hornets strength this season was a veteran offensive line that paved the way for the Division 1-AA rushing title.

The Hornets gained 2,987 yards on the ground and averaged 298.7 ypg.

The Hornets balanced running attack was led by two-time All-MEAC fullback Michael Murray. Murray ran for 708 yards and five TD's on 158 carries, despite missing two games. Halfbacks Doug Reed, Tony Be-thea and Wendell Watson equally shared the rest of the Hornets powerful run game.

The rushing yards were generated by a strong line are tackles Gerald Lee, Steven Morris and Greg

Johnson. Guard Scott Andrews and tight-end William Lewis were also pivotal in the Hornets run game.

After weeks of debating, shuffling and deliberating during pre-season drills for a steady quarterback, Coach Collick decided to go with senior Quarterback Curtis Williams. Williams started the season an improved four year player and finished the season a confident, and accurate passer with the uncanny ability to run the Hornet offense.

Williams completed 71 of 147 passes for 1,102 yards and 10 TD's. The bulk of Williams' passes were caught by all everything split end David Jones. Jones caught 53 passes for 1,049 yards and nine TD's. Jones broke John Taylors school records for receptions, receiving yards in a season and receiving yards in a career.

Defensively, the senior oriented front linebackers were the strong point for an up and down Hornet defense. But a young defensive

backfield could not handle the load when they called on and they were called on often.

The Hornets secondary yielded 238 ypg including a 478 yard performance by FAMU's Tony Ezell.

The rush defense which allowed just 76.8 ypg, also finished 1 in 1-AA in rushing defense. For the second season in a row linebacker Craig Parsely and All-MEAC Defensive End Malcolm Showell lead the team in tackles and sacks. Parsely recorded 62 tackles while Showell slumped to a mere 5 sacks in 1990. Andy Harris finished second on the team in tackles (53) while Ed James finished third with (48).

The two strong points in the Hornet secondary were Hawk backer James Redding and Safety Brian Randall. Redding had three interceptions, four sacks and was fourth on the team with (46) tackles. Randall led the team with six interceptions and added 41 tackles.

TURNER HURDLES TO ATHLETE OF THE WEEK HONORS

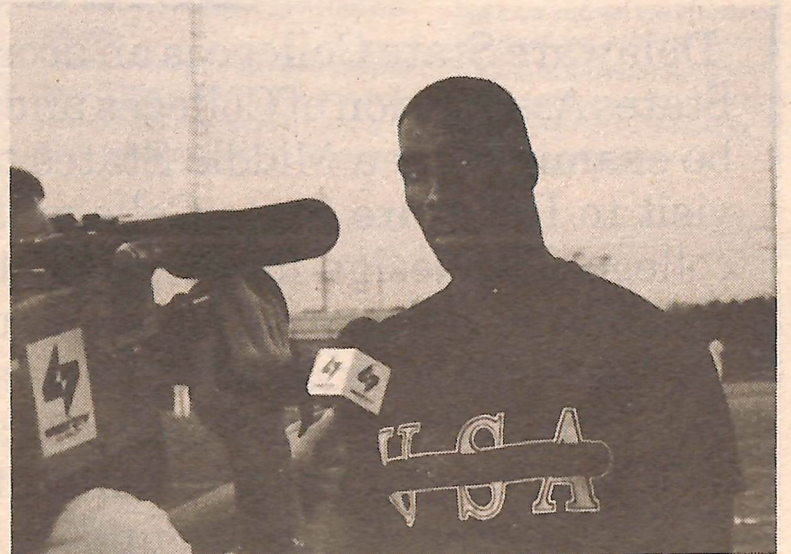

Hunter and Newman Honored For Career Achievements

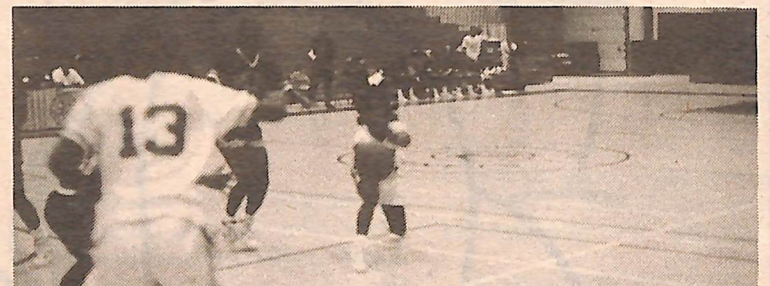

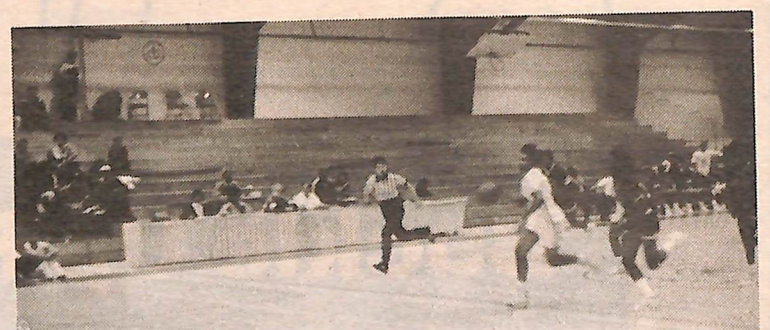
Davis Honored For Milestones

DSC vs. Bowie quick pass from Sabrina to Stephanie. (DSC Hornet photo by K. Gadson)



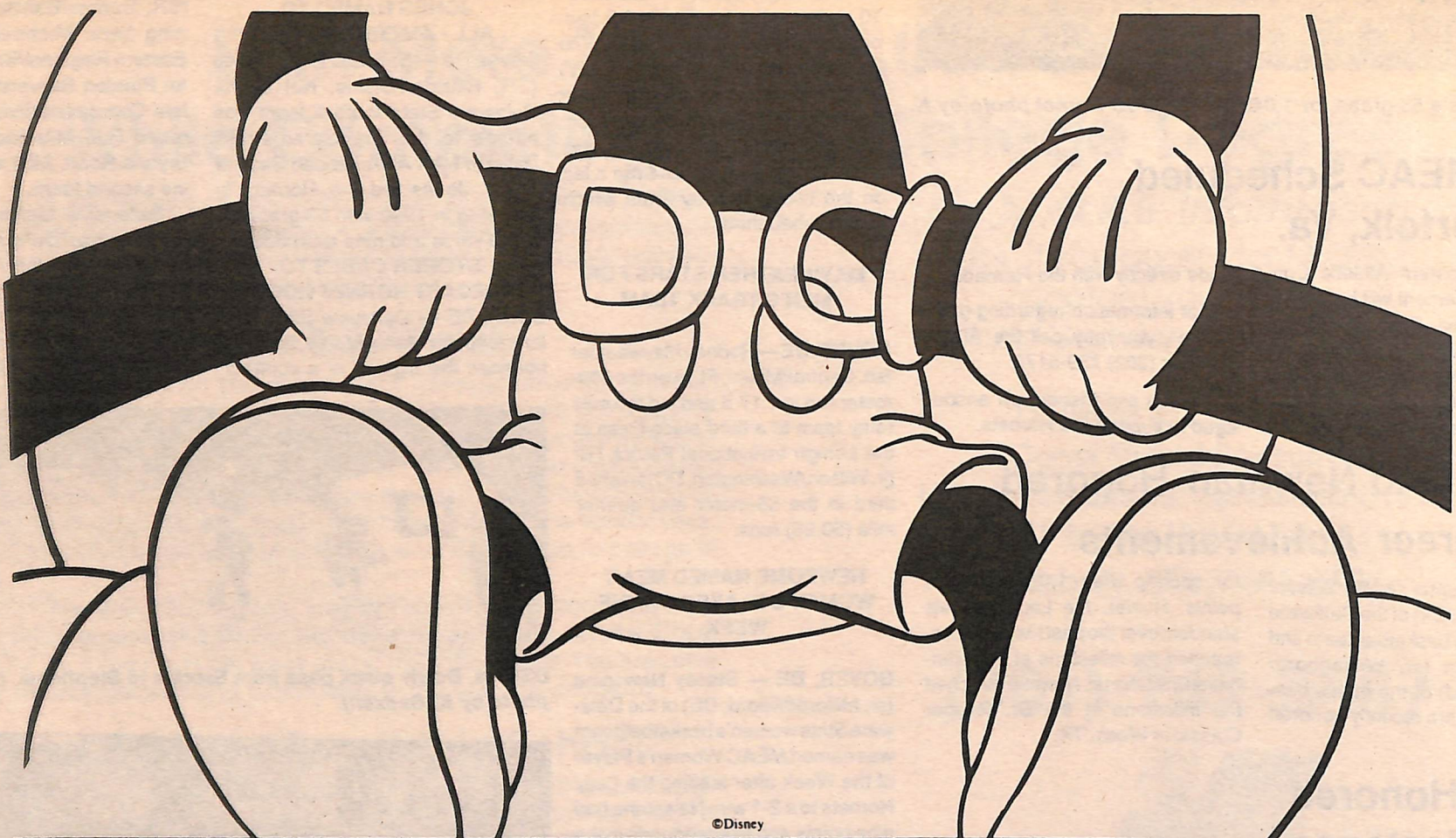

Rebel Music

A group of black teenagers huddled near the Student Center stage, jumped and pumped their fists while shouting: "Go! Go! Go!" Grinning and grimacing, one woman draped in a long black sweater, and four men sporting colorful biker gear and hightop sneakers bounced about the stage. From behind the ear-piercing electric rhythms came the steady chant... greed... steal... kill... burn the flag!"

Judging by the variation in the crowd's antics (some onlookers sat quietly), the Mirror of Society Concert II had succeeded in placing listeners in moods ranging from awe to elation. PBR Streetgang, a five-member Black Rock Coalition (BRC) band from Brooklyn, N.Y., was in town. The mission return rock-n-roll to its original black roots.

Songwriter/vocalist Bruce Mack shook his long dreadlocks, hammered at his keyboards and delivered a spitfire rap to rowdy followers as well as silent onlookers.

Vocalist Amafujo Inniss pranced about the stage, frequently pausing at the mike to brush aside her thick braids and add a heartfelt "uh-huh" or "yeah."

Drummer William McClellan's hardcore beats complemented his visible black and white T-shirt which read "F—k Censorship."

assist Mark Peterson was as good with his feet as with his hands. He stepped and swayed the entire night while managing to keep the baseline wicked.

Guitarist Anthony Peterson smirked, shook his floppy dreads and, like a flash of lightning, unleashed a screaming guitar that would have made Hendrix proud.

PBR Streetgang's all band action was impressive.

Suddenly, the music stopped. Mack addressed the crowd. "You've got to hear these lyrics because what we're saying is important."

Mack's lyrics dealt with reality. SOUL UNDERGROUND reporter Michael Alan Gonzales indicated that "PBR seems to be shouting in the face of a sorrowful city." The band touched on subjects ranging

from drug abuse to political propaganda.

"Check the president on TV telling lies... You are animals. That's what you are. You are animals...not fit for human love."

The lyrics were not sung with blind rage though. In fact, many of the songs were vocalized with evident pain and question.

"Where do we run to? Where do we hide? What do we look for on the other side," questioned Mack as he scowled, outstretched his hand and grasped for the answer.

The night's most memorable event occurred when Inniss seized the crowd with a painful, pronounced cry. "...I stray away cuz my world's too far away from here," sang Inniss. Just as her stunning revival of Janice Joplin rock pushed to its climax, Anthony Peterson entered with his screaming guitar. Glaring at some fixed point in the auditorium's rear, Peterson dropped to his knees, rested his fiery instrument on the back of his neck, and ripped the crowd with electric fury mirroring that of Prince and Hendrix.

As if this were not enough, the mega-talented Streetgang managed to squeeze in some rhythmic reggae while chanting with the crowd:

"Peace to the motherland... Peace to the motherland..."

Dwayne Hicks, a Delaware State College student and musician, enjoyed the show. After the explosive performance, he complimented the band's style. "They can play for any crowd and go places," said Hicks. "Once they got the energy going, there was nothing they couldn't do."

After ripping the frontstage, Mack and his posse stepped backstage to chat about the concept of black rock. Mack wasted little time in expressing his concern with blacks failing to accept rock as their own creation. He indicated that mainstream radio programming and images projected by the media enhance the public's ignorance.

There's a lot of misunderstanding," said Mack. "We shouldn't be limited.... We're just trying to live our culture."

PBR Streetgang is a top band of

the Black Rock Coalition (BRC). Vernon Reid, guitarist of the popular rock group Living Color, and journalist Greg Tate founded the coalition in 1985 to assist blacks interested in rock.

Mack said the industry fails to diligently promote black acts. Mack went further to say that black rock bands are sometimes discouraged.

It is ironic that a musical concept invented by Little Richard, inflated by James Brown, and immortalized by Jimmy Hendrix is often snubbed by black listeners.

Mack indicated that black bands should not be confined to a specific form of musical expression. His talented group has chosen to walk the path paved long ago by musicians such as Fats Domino, Big Mama Thornton and Ray Charles. Walk on PBR Streetgang!

PBR Streetgang plans to release a four-record EP, said Mack. The songs are entitled "All I Want," "Spaced Out Wonderchild," "A Better Life," and "Eyes On You."

Distinguished agricultural graduates of the past four decades were honored and Clayton Yeutter, United States Secretary of Agriculture spoke encouraging words during the 100th Founder's Day Celebration in the Education Humanities Center on February 3rd.

James H. Vestal, 1957; Clarence Austin, 1966; Isaac E. Jackson, 1967; Richard W. Goerger, 1969; Dr. Keith M. Howard; and Wanda A. Wilson, DVM 1986, were presented with plaques and applauded for their hard work and excellence.

The recipients recieved their awards graciously and spoke of how Delaware State College prepared them for the work world.

"I am proud to be a graduate of Delaware State College," said Jackson, a member of the class of 1967. "It was here that I was given a foundation and encouraged to go forward and compete..."

Jackson then addresssed the students. "You too should be proud...you too will be prepared to compete with the very best and brightest," he said.

Goerger a 1969 graduate also gave students a boost of confidence about the strength of a college degree. "Academic excellence does open doors," he said.

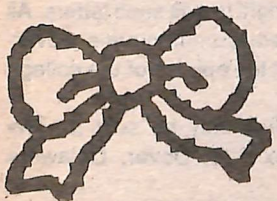
pose, and therefore shouldn't effect you," said the Quintals.

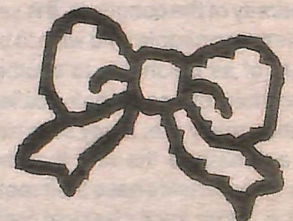

The Bitter Fruits of War

Every empire has required an external enemy, in order to justify its measures to suppress domestic unrest, and to silence its internal critics. Every empire must have a focal point to channel its aggressive objectives. Ancient Rome had Carthage; Napoleon had the British. The fundamental basis of American power in the twentieth century has been the quest for empire. In Southeast Asia, the declared goal of "containing Communism" was responsible for the deaths of 50,000 American troops and millions of additional casualties among the Vietnamese people. The propaganda of American power has always created external enemies, larger-than-life figures which are used to justify massive military expenditures.

Saddam Hussein is only the latest in a series of "political demons" created by the U.S. media, government officials and the corporate elite. To an infantile language more appropriate to Saturday afternoon



wrestling matches on television, the public villification of Saddam is personalized by Bush and his flunkies. To preserve corporate domination of world oil markets, and to assert American Military hegemony in the Mideast, filling the vacuum left by the Soviets, the masses of U.S. citizens are being manipulated into endorsing a war in which thousands of innocent people will become victims.

In the euphoria generated by America's blitzkrieg against Iraq in the opening days of the war, the stock market soared and oil prices fell to August, 1990 lows. The American people were told that the

fruits of war would be the easy destruction of an evil dictator, the crushing of international terrorism, and the reestablishment of the U.S. as a Superpower.

Few measured the real human costs of war, upon both its victors and victims. The fruits of war are young children who must be told that their father, a young flight lieutenant, was shot down in his F-16 fighter over Baghdad, never to return home. The fruits of war are the mothers and fathers of wounded and captured soldiers, who must worry as parents only can about their children, and yet are powerless to do anything about it. The fruits of war are young women and men who will lose their limbs, or are paralyzed or blinded by mortar fire, and must be retrained to enter the workforce. The fruits of war are the thousands of American families whose economic lives are disrupted, pushed to the edge of bankruptcy, falling behind in mortgage payments,

because one parent in the army reserve has been shipped out to Saudi Arabia.

Television reporters tell us about "surgical air strikes" by American bombers, a concept both absurd and dishonest. Pilots speeding at one thousand miles per hour, dropping one ton bombs guided by lasers, are not conducting kidney transplants or brain microsurgery. They are obliterating families, homes, mosques, and centers of daily life. The sixteen year old boys in the Iraqi army are not the security thugs who raped and murdered Kuwaiti people. They are also the innocent victims, sacrificing their lives beneath American bombardments.

This unnecessary, avoidable and indefensible war is not against Saddam Hussein. It is, in effect, a massive attack against the Iraqi people specifically, and generally against the entire Arab World. The fruits of war are guilt, shame, and

the immoral responsibility for acts of military terrorism which equal or exceed those committed in Kuwait by Saddam Hussein.

The only positive fruits produced by war are the protests of those who oppose death and destruction. People of conscience are taking a stand. In Hiroshima, survivors of the 1945 atomic bombing staged a sit-in. In Germany, one hundred thousand marched the day after the war began. In San Francisco, nearly one thousand antiwar demonstrators were arrested, the most ever in a single day in that city's turbulent history. In New York City, five thousand protested, tying up traffic for hours. Major demonstrations were organized in Washington D.C. The bitter fruits of war will only be ended when the American people regain control of their own government, demanding an end to the politics of empire and violence, which threatens the peace of the world.

The Mis-Education of African-Americans

I think it is extremely important that conscious African-Americans view the problem of mis-education as not just an academic crisis, but also as a method white supremacists use to maintain over the racially oppressed masses on this country and throughout the world. How can a course dealing with the world exist without some detailed mentioning of the contributions of Africans.

To truly comprehend the horrors of mis-education one must first know the detrimental effects upon our people. A black psychologist did an experiment in which some black college students were hypnotized with no knowledge of their culture or heritage. During the hypnotic trance all ties to the past were out. They were then interviewed once in a hypnotic state and once in normal circumstances. The students recalled feelings of frustration, tiredness and most importantly, anger and hopelessness.

It is clear that the negative characterizations of our history and the absence of positive references, has a damaging effect on our people. It is absolutely essential that we understand how the way we are mis-educated plays a significant role in the problems we face.

The United States didn't do anything at that time to prevent Adolph Hitler from taking over the majority of Europe. By confronting Saddam with a military force not seen or used since Vietnam, the WORLD is telling him "LOOK OUT BUDDY" and "THE REST OF THE WORLD WON'T STAND FOR THIS." When I say the rest of the world, I mean, "THE REST OF THE WORLD." Granted, the United States does have the majority of forces but only because we have the largest military force in the "FREE WORLD." The FIRST ARTICLE OF THE BILL OF RIGHTS gives us the right to protest without being harassed. That's what it's all about, the right and freedom to speak one's mind freely. It seems every generation in the last 200 years has had a war to contend with. I've had two, Vietnam and this one. Let's hope and pray this is the last war.

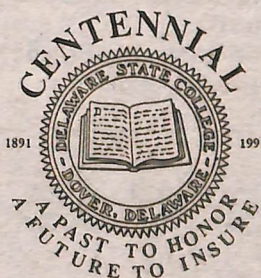

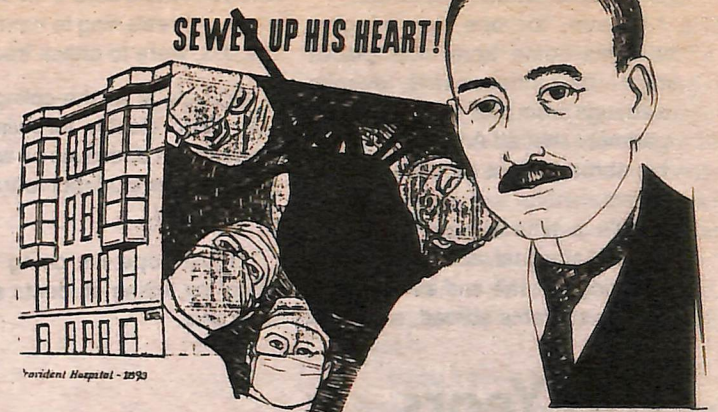

War Prompts Campuses To Call Study-Abroad Students Home

(CPS) Several schools have told U.S. students studying abroad to come home in the aftermath of the outbreak of war in the Persian Gulf Jan. 16.

Some students, however, apparently have decided to stay overseas, foreign study officials report.

Several students who decided to stay in Europe have reported being the object of occasional verbal hostilities, but no one has been physically harmed.

Georgetown University closed its programs in Turkey and Italy, and told students studying in Israel and Cairo to come home even before hostilities had broken out, reported Georgetown spokeswoman Anne Jones.

Moreover, the school suggested that students in all other study abroad programs come home as well, but warned them not to be on airplanes if war broke out.

Georgetown's action, in turn, stampeded other students into calling home.

"That just wreaked havoc on all the other (schools') programs," said Joan Solaun, Study Abroad Office director at the University of Illinois at Champaign.

When overseas students from other colleges heard Georgetown's warning, they panicked and called their own offices asking if they should come home, Solaun explained.

Solaun, for one, felt bringing students home from most places might be unnecessary, despite warnings from the U.S. State Department that all Americans traveling abroad might be targets of terrorists.

"It's a time for calm and prudence," she said, adding that Illinois is taking a "wait and see" attitude with its students abroad, except for

those in Israel.

"We felt we had to bring them home," Solaun said.

Although no students abroad from Oregon's Lewis and Clark College have chosen to come home, two out of 22 students pulled out of a group going to France, said Vance Savage, dean of the college's international education program.

"Six or eight" students from American University in Washington, D.C., opted not to go to Europe, said Dave Brown, dean of AU's Washington Semester and World Capitals programs.

Some students who have chosen to stay overseas have encountered anti-American hostilities, although no personal abuse, Savage said.

"Luckily, most folks abroad are courteous enough to know the difference" between the American government and American students, Savage added.

A female American student said she had been verbally accosted by an Arab male outside a bar in London, Solaun said.

Solaun and other study abroad directors agree American students abroad should try to be inconspicuous.

"We don't hang our shingle out," admitted American's Brown.

Students studying in Florence received letters before the war from a group threatening to harm them if the U.S. were to attack Iraq.

Officials at all the colleges said they were closely following State Department directives on whether it was safe for students to travel and stay abroad.

"I just hope I'm doing the right thing" by letting students stay, Solaun said.

Bush Asks Collegians To Get Behind The War Effort

(CPS) Apparently hoping to defuse a gathering anti-war movement on the nation's campuses, President Bush sent an unusual letter to some of the country's 14 million collegians Jan. 12, asking them to support his stand against Saddam Hussein.

Bush also promised to try to resolve the crisis peacefully.

"The president felt it was important to communicate directly with them," Bush press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said of the letter to students, adding that many students received the letter just a few weeks ago.

In his two-page letter sent to about 460 college publications, Bush explained his policy rationale.

"If armed men invaded a home in this country, killed those in their way, stole what they wanted and then announced the house was now theirs - no one would hesitate about what must be done," he wrote.

"And that is why we cannot hesitate about what must be done halfway around the world in Kuwait," Bush said. "The facts are clear. The choice unambiguous. Right vs. wrong."

"We thought it was pretty much a joke," said Hideki Tomeoka, associate editor of the University of Washington's paper, the Daily. The editors received the letter by fax machine Jan. 8 and ran it the next day as a guest opinion with the headline "Words Of Wonder From Mr. Bush." An accompanying editorial cartoon of the President called it "bullshit."

Other editors just returning from winter break, like those at the University of Notre Dame and Oberlin College, said they hadn't yet finalized plans on how to run the letter. "I was surprised at first," said Kelley Tuthill, news editor for Notre Dame's The Observer. "But he does have to

be accountable to us.

"It was condescending at some points," Tuthill continued, referring to Bush's explanation on "right vs. wrong." "Students know what's going on."

"If there's one place on the homefront Bush has to worry about, it's college campuses," added Eric Pfanner, editor of the Daily Nebraskan, the paper at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

"I guess we're not on Bush's most-important list," said Kay Hilton, editor of the Sidelines, the student paper at Middle Tennessee State University, which didn't get a letter. Hilton described campus reaction to the crisis as "pretty mixed."

In the letter, Bush also recalled his days as a teenage combat pilot in World War II.

"I have been in war," Bush said. "I know the terror of combat."

Ed. Dept. Releases Predictions For College In The Year 2001

(CPS) By 2001, women will earn more doctoral degrees than men, but men will continue to earn more medical and law degrees, the U.S. Department of Education predicted in January.

The predictions were among dozens published by the department, which oversees most federal college programs, in a new book that throws together many of the government's statistical studies of the nation's schools.

The results should help planners reform schools for the next century, department officials maintained.

"It's imperative that we think about and plan for our schools and the

children we will serve in the coming decade," explained acting Secretary of Education Ted Sanders.

One of the most noticeable changes will be the growing dominance of women in U.S. grad schools.

Since 1976, the number of men receiving doctoral degrees has been decreasing while the number of women receiving those degrees has increased. In 2001, women are expected to earn 18,900 Ph.D's. Men will earn 17,300.

While the distribution between men and women of first law and medical degrees has shifted dramatically in the last third of the century, in 2001 men will continue

to earn more degrees, 41,400 to women's 29,900.

Among the report's other findings:

Colleges nationwide will continue to hand out more than one million bachelor's degrees a year throughout the 1990s. Master's degrees are expected to rise, reaching 327,000 by 2001.

Women will continue to be the majority in each class that begins college during the 1990s, as they have every year since 1979.

Higher education enrollment will climb from 13.4 million in 1989 to 14.4 million in 2001. The biggest gains will be at public campuses.

Wedding Bells Sound More Like The Telephone

Ball State University student Kandy Green Lee married former Ball State student John Lee, a reservist now serving in Saudi Arabia, in a telephone wedding ceremony Jan. 23.

The ceremony had to be moved up an hour because of the threat of renewed Iraqi attacks on Lee's base at Dhahran, noted Delaware (Ind.) Superior Court Judge Richard Dailey, who conducted the conference call service.

More War Protests

In what anti-war organizers had billed as a "key test of whether sentiment is growing against the war in the Middle East," about 75,000 protesters marched in Washington, D.C. Jan. 27, up from an estimated crowd of 25,000 the previous weekend.

Peace marches also unfolded at the universities of Akron, Arizona and Washington, as well as at Pur-

due and Mankato State universities, among other places.

Only about 500 of the University of California at Los Angeles' 33,000 students attended a Jan. 24 "alternative day of education" about the Persian Gulf, an excused absence granted by Chancellor Charles Young as part of a bargain to get 113 anti-war demonstrators to quit a 22-hour sit-in at UCLA's administration building the week before.

President Refuses To Speak

Diether Haenicke, president of Western Michigan University, refused to deliver a scheduled address commemorating Martin Luther King Jr. Jan. 21, saying he feared the MLK Day rally would turn into an anti-war protest.

"I was under the (impression) that I was to speak at Kanley Chapel," Haenicke told the Western Herald. However, he was shuttled to MLK ceremonies at a local park instead. When it was his turn to speak "I declined because it seemed more of an anti-war protest."

War "humor"

"War humor" is worth studying, maintained psychologist Harvey Mindness of Antioch University in California, if only as a way to judge how upset people are about conflict. Among Mindness' favorite examples:

Q. What do Hiroshima, Nagasaki and Baghdad have in common?

A. Nothing, yet.

Q. What's the national bird of Israel?

A. Duck.

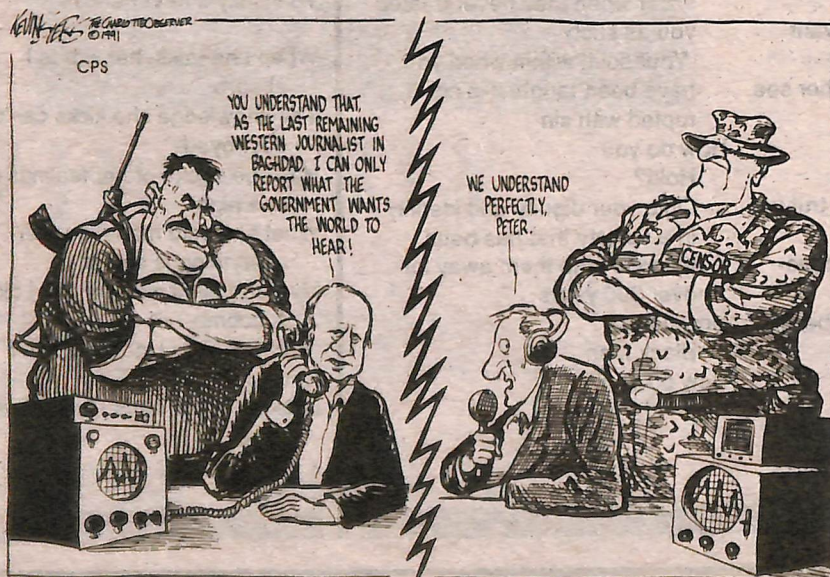

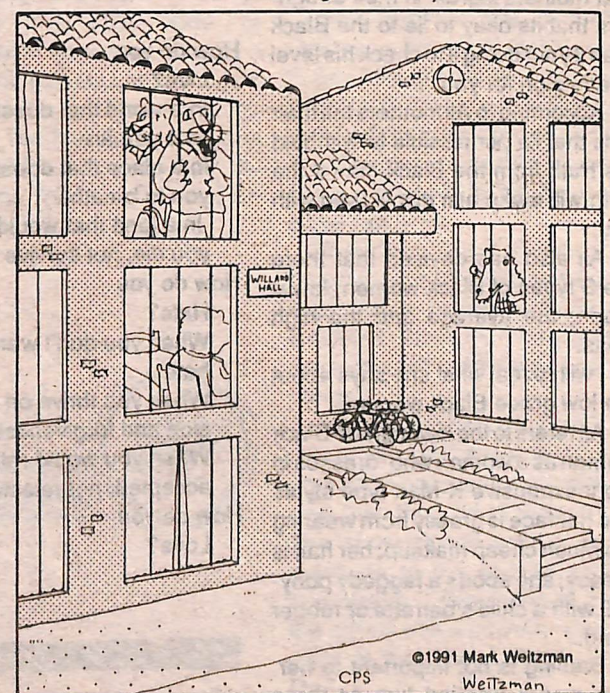

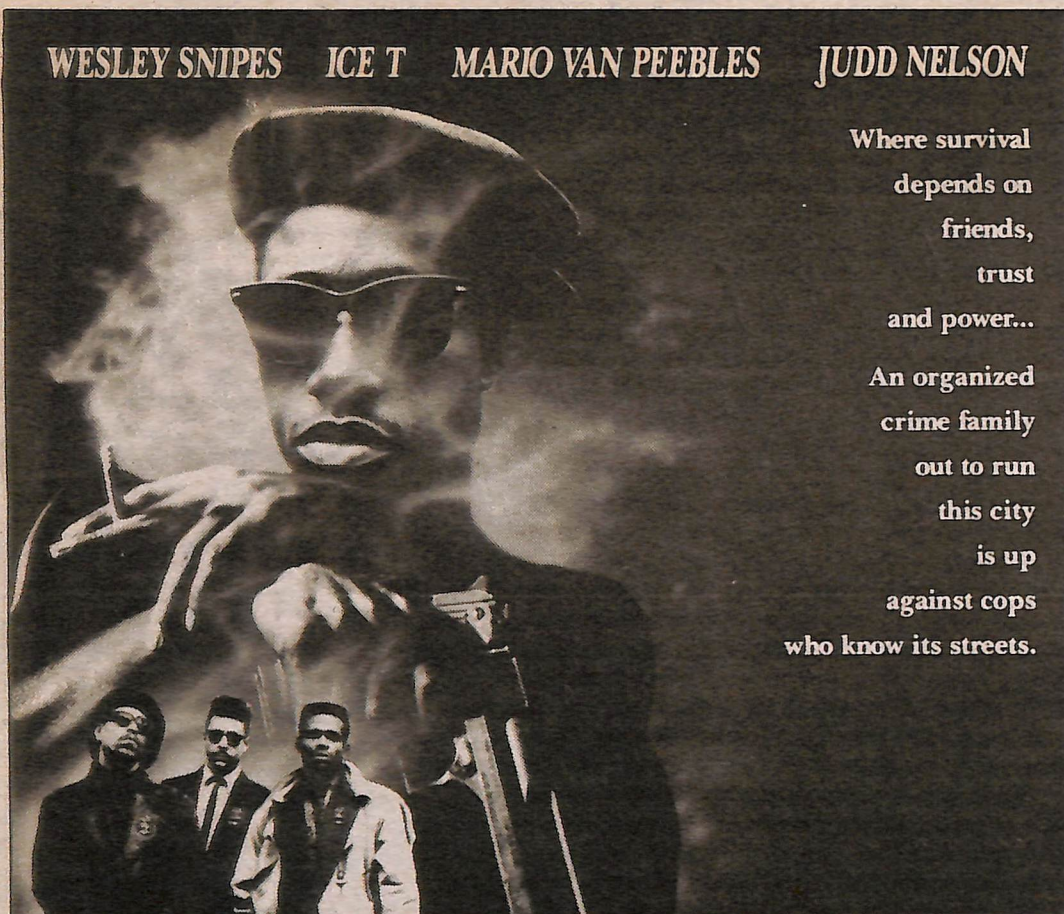

HEAVYWEIGHT GRAPPLER ATHLETE OF THE WEEK HONORS

Marvin Hicks (jr. Lake Forest/Harrington, DE) of the Delaware State College wrestling team won all four of his matches in a 1-3 week for the Hornets and was named Delaware State College Athlete of the Week during the first week in February. Wrestling at heavyweight, Hicks picked up victories in dual matches against Newport News, Longwood, Salisbury State and Glassboro State. Joe Archangelo (so. Claymont/Claymont, DE) had a 3-1 week for the Hornets at 134,

while Scott Fleming (sr. Lake Forest/Harrington, DE) picked up two wins in two tries wrestling at 190.

DAVIS SCORES CAREER POINT 2,000

Tom Davis (sr. Willingboro/Philadelphia, PA) of the Delaware State men's basketball team scored his 2,000th career point in the Hornets loss to North Carolina A&T. Davis is the first Division I player in the state of Delaware to accomplish the feat. "This is probably my biggest accomplishment yet," Davis said. "Few players get a chance at 2,000 points and I'm just happy to be one of the few. I just wish it could have come

the Week honors. Jean Vanderpool (sr. St. Augustine/Nassau, Bahamas) took second place for the Hornets in the pole vault with a leap of 13-0. Delaware State finished fourth with 51 team points. South Carolina State won the meet with 120 points.
