At noon January 18th in the Humanities Building, Delaware State University and the Inner City Cultural League, Inc., presented the Martin Luther King Jr. National Holiday Program. The celebration's theme was "Remember! Celebrate! Act! A day on, not a day off!" Not many students knew about the program; flyers were scarce, if they even existed.

Mrs. Nettye Handy Evens, a retired educator and the Delmarva Baha'i Youth Workshop began the main part of the program with a tribute to Dr. King in poetry and dance. They presented a non-speaking skit involving some of the issues youth of all races face in America such as racism and violence. As they portrayed their roles, Dr. King's "I Have a Dream" speech played and was creatively edited to have mystical panflute music play during brief breaks.

The remainder of the program was

loaded with heavy Christian influence, beginning with the Sankofa African Dancers and Drummers, This youth group presented a faster paced skit, also without words. The dancers performed a church service in dance complete with minister's robe and church style fans with Dr. King's face

Gospel selections from the Young Adult Network Choir and Mt. Zion African Methodist Episcopal Church Christians shout "Hallelujah!" and "Yes Lawd!" An alto Sax solo gave added the finishing touch. Right after the final verse of "Soon and very soon, we are going to see the king, Dr. Delauder appeared on the scene,

to introduce the keynote speaker.

Before he did however, he informed the crowd that two queens were present: Ms. American Classical Woman Deloris Blakely, and Ms. Teen Delaware Ashley Coleman.

Then the time for the keynote speaker arrived. Mr. August Hazeur. Hazeur retired from being Chief Pharmacist at Jack Eckerd Corporation in 1976 due to visual impairment. He is now a resident of Wilmington, Delaware. One of Mr. Hazeur's daughters is among the Delaware's first nationally certified teachers, while the other is a councilor a Del. Tech.

Hazeur showed great respect for Dr. King from the start, stating, "Dr. King had an infinite capacity for love...'thou shalt love thy neighbor as thy love thyself' was the precept which guided his life." His praise

continued, "The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King was a man of God." Mr. Hazeur's speech was full of Christian Doctrine and one of the only breaks was when he said that King was

by both militants who said he was moving to slow, and conservatives who said he was moving too quickly."

He referred to Jesus suffering for mankind and noted that King did the same "To suffer for mankind is Godly," he said. He then

called Dr. King's work a "Messianic Mission" and claimed King was a "Modern Day David" who challenged the Goliath of racism, bigotry, and humanity.

"Moses lead his people out of Egypt, Dr. King lead his people from lethargic resignation to acute assertiveness...Moses was denied admission to the promised land because of divine intervention, [Dr. King] was denied realization of a just society because of an assassin's bullet." Mr. Hazeur received a standing ovation as he finished with authority asking, "Does the flame of love which he so nobly ignited burn in our hearts?...The king is dead, long live

Activists, Leaders... STAND UP!

At the beginning of the Black Leadership Conference, held at George Mason University, I found myself questioning its very purpose. I even accused it of being part of the resumé-filling conference type (especially for such a short occasion). I mean, what was really to be accomplished in two days? Well, I do not know what it was, or when precisely, but as the event wound down something happened. Between the repetition of the watchwords and the speakers' passion for their messages, I was...touched.

My first lecture impressed on me the importance of understanding the imminent arrival of the New Millenium. The speakers stressed the need for unity, as they demonstrated the significant physical count of Blacks in America and the power of our collective dollar. Anthony Hagan, who led the discussion, sent me reeling when he quoted staggering statistics. If all Blacks in America came together economically, they could constitute the sixth largest economy in the world! It would knock Italy right out of its esteemed position in the G7. And, if you think about it, the evidence is right before us. Why else, if not for the power of our dollar, does an arguably racially preferential Tommy Hilfiger dedicate an urban line to African-Americans? The airwaves that shunned black expression just a few decades ago now belt R&B and Hip-Hop (at least a station or two per city). Question: Do you know who really owns Black Entertainment Television? Research!

So, after gaining a perspective on what we as a people could do, I was further educated to be active, rather

than passive; to embrace activism as a duty. Hagan and his panel delved into a definition of the word 'activism' and cited examples of its many forms. This triggered something I was told years ago: "In the 60's, the issue was access, now the issue is performance." As minimal and inadequate as it is, there is now some representation in environments estranged to minority participation as recently as thirty years ago. Affirmative Action, as a policy, is holding on for dear life, as its very existence is threatened (by some of the very individuals it has helped). But the question posed to you, the reader, and to me is: Are we taking this access seriously? Are we using this access to education, information, technology and other tools of elevation effectively? Or, are we allowing representation to slip out of our hands because of inertia and despondence?

After seeing activism as a necessary service to the rest of our Nation of Color, my next lecture choice turned the focus within. Upon the insistence of my fellow students, I attended the lecture titled Leadership Without Limits." Everyone who came out of the morning session of that lecture appeared drained and overwhelmed, yet enlightened and touched. "This man," they said, "This Mr. Gilbert Morris was incredible." Any effort to get some secondhand feedback on the morning lecture only led to excited bursts of chatter that did not make much sense, but the light in their eyes was unmistakable.

This was the introspective part that defined integrity and forced each participant to check for this, among other leadership qualities, within. Just the

process of identifying these qualities gave each person something to work on. As Professor Morris continued, I saw the reason for the unintelligible excitement of my peers. As he expatiated on the theme of the three watchwords (Preparation, Commitment, and Dedication), he inspired his listeners as he intertwined the quoted words of others with quotable verses of his own. I cannot underscore enough what an inspiration he was.

And when I thought I could ingest no more and be inspired no further, Michael L. Whitlock, an alumnus of the host college, George Mason University, proceeded to share his pearls of wisdom. His message was the embodiment of the conceptual seeds Professor Morris had planted. His content summarized everything that proceeded it at the conference. Before me stood a recent alumnus of GMU whose political aspirations were born of the seeds of activism and planted by ancestors who understood service to one's people. The career plan, which he shared, was the work of a young man who had drank from the same cup of wisdom as Professor Morris, even if his years in this world meant his sip was smaller.

As he encouraged us to be prepared intellectually and technologically, it finally registered for me that, prepared or not, we are all fast approaching a time in which each people will either lead or be led. Those who dare to prepare, to create, to stand together, will lead. It is essential that we equip ourselves for tomorrow though we may not be able

to see it in our mind's eye. It is critical that we position ourselves to be a part of the group that designs the future. Whitlock's closing words summarize it best: "Let your dreams be your only limitations.'

On the ride back, I thought of the difference a few short hours at a conference had made. I am not saying that we are born again students, freed from inertia and negativity for all time. But, I am saying that my skepticism was replaced by inspiration. I had been jolted to purposeful thought; the kind that precedes activism, even if, for the time being, my goals consist of a dedication to my complete and thorough education in and out of the classroom.

### Education vs. Incarceration

Today there are more than 1.8 million people who are incarcerated in federal facilities, state prisons and local jails across the United States. We now imprison more people than any other country on earth. Since 1980, about one thousand new prisons and jails have been built in the U.S., at the cost of tens of billions of dollars. This elaborate network of coercive institutions is essentially a means of social control for Black, Latino and low-income people. It is no accident, for example, that one half of all inmates are black, that one out of every fourteen black adult males are currently in jail or prison, or that over one out of every three African American males in their twenties are today either in prison or jail, on probation, parole or awaiting

These grim statistics reflect a dra-conian yet strategic decision made by America's political and corporate America's political and corporate establishment to redirect billions of dollars away from human needs spending—such as health care, public transportation, job training programs and public housing - toward the construction of a prison - industrial complex that today is destroying millions of lives. Perhaps the clearest example of this is the destructive trade-off between public education and incarceration.

A recent study produced by the Correctional Association of New York and Washington, D.C. based Justice Policy Institute, illustrates that in New York State hundreds of millions of dollars have been stolen from the budgets of public universities and reallocated to prison construction. The report states: "Since fiscal year 1988, New York's public universities have seen their operating budgets plummet by 29 percent while funding for prisons has increased by 76 per-cent. In actual dollars, there has nearly been an equal trade-off, with the Department of Correctional Services receiving a \$761 million increase during that time while state funding for New York's city and state university systems has declined by \$615 mil-

By 1998, New York state was spending nearly twice what it had allocated to run its prison system a decade ago. To pay for that massive expansion, tuition and fees for students at the State University of New York (SUNY) and the City University of New York (CUNY) had to be dramatically hiked. The New York study

found that the total cost for typical undergraduate student to attend a SUNY school, including tuition, books, room and board, rose from \$7,319 in 1991 to \$11,201 by 1997, an increase of 35 percent. The state government also cut its levels of support to CUNY, a system whose students are overwhelmingly Black, Latino, working class and poor. Since 1988, the state share of the CUNY budget has fallen from about 77 percent to 49 percent. Tuition and fees for full-time CUNY undergraduates in that decade roughly doubled.

The basic impact on Black and Latino young adults had been to make Latino young adults had been to make it simultaneously much more difficult to attend college, but much easier to go to prison. The New York study found: "There are more Blacks (34,809) and Hispanics (22,421) locked up in prison than there are attending SUNY, where there are 27,925 Black and 17,845 Hispanic students. Since 1989 there have been 27,925 Black and 17,845 Hispanic students. Since 1989, there have been more blacks entering the prison system for drug offenses each year than there were graduating from SUNY with undergraduate, masters and doctoral degrees - combined."

The pattern of schools vs. prisons present in New York exists throughout

the country. Thousands of Black and Latino young adults in California are denied access to state universities because of the passage of Proposition 209, which destroyed affirmative action. Thousands more have been driven out due to steadily growing costs for tuition and cutbacks in student loans. Meanwhile, hundreds of millions of dollars has been siphoned from the state's education budget and

spent on building prisons.
In 1977, California had 19,600 inmates in its state prison system. By 1997, it was almost 160,000. According to researcher Eric Schlosser in a recent Atlantic Monthly article, in the past twenty years, California has constructed twenty-one new prisons. California currently has the largest single prison system in the industrial-ized world, "holding more inmates in its jails and prisons than do France, Great Britain, Germany, Japan, Singapore, and the Netherlands combined." And future trends are worse. The California Department of Corrections recently estimated that it must spend \$6.1 billion in the next ten years just to maintain the present prison population.

For years, black activists and other political progressives have been warning that the U.S. is in danger of becoming a "police state." even the official statistics from the government confirm this. According to a June 1998 report-from the Bureau of Justice, the total number of full-time state and local officers with arrest powers was 663,335 by 1996.

Instead of funding teachers, we are hiring more prison guards. Instead of building new classrooms, we are constructing new jails. One of the central battlegrounds for democratic rights in the U.S. in the twentyfirst century will be the effort to halt the dismantling of education for the expansion of the prison - industrial complex. We must mobilize to resist these destructive forces. We must demand alternative spending policies from our elected officials, moving us away from imprisoning minds to

## Student Government News Update

#### **Leadership Conference**

In January, the President of Student Government, Vice President for Programming, and advisor to SGA, with the Junior Class President and two Junior Class officers and a representative for W.H.I.P. attended the National Black Student Leadership Conference at the Richmond Marriott in Richmond, Virginia. Some of the inspirational speakers included: Winnie Mandela, John Hope Franklin, Aminata Njeri, Willie Jolley, Charles Barron, Patricia Russell McCloud, James Wright, and S. Purnell.

The conference proved to be money well spent, as everyone thoroughly enjoyed the experience, and learned a great deal of information on self-esteem, the media, financial stability, graduate school, political climate, and dynamic leadership.

### Committee Updates Research Committee

In the search to further enhance campus life for students, Delaware State University's SGA has put together a research committee in charge of constructing surveys and gathering knowledge of public opinion about topics that are of concern to the students. The committee, consisting of Crystal Wright, My'chelle Bryant, Crystal Best and Kenneth Bruce, firmly believe in representing the needs and wants of the students in order to create a more suitable campus environment. In the near future, the committee hopes to research the concerns of the students through the use of surveys. Students' concerns will then be addressed by the Student Government Association. However, we need YOUR input to make a change! "Knowledge is power and enthusiasm pulls the switch." - Steve Drake.

The president of SGA held discussions with a potential research committee to not only gather data, but also to gain feedback on a myriad of issues about the campus that needed to be addressed. The first surveys will address issues such as use of the gym, freshman transition week, class officers, and violence on the DSU campus.

#### Strategic Planning Committee

The main topic of discussion was enrollment, and student opinions on an increase in tuition to balance the budget needs of the university. There was objection to this by the SGA President, who then made the suggestion of increasing the alumni gift, considering that the gift for the last fiscal year was less than \$74,000. Dr. Tolliver stated that the problem was a vacancy in the position of VP of Institutional Advancement.

#### Residence Hall Update

During the month of January, the SGA President, Men's Council President, and Women's Senate President toured the Residence Halls that were supposed to receive maintenance over the Holiday Break

Conwell: the upgrade is done. However, all the panels are not completed. In addressing this issue with Mr. Mosby, Director of Facilities Management, Mosby stated that the panel would soon be finished, and would have no effect on the power. AS A RESULT, CON-

WELL HALL HAS NO POWER CONSTRAINTS.

Tubman: The two bathrooms are complete, but, according to residents, it is still highly inconvenient to go from floor to floor to use the bathrooms. The windows are not yet replaced. Dr. Smith, VP of Enrollment Management and Student Affairs, stated that most, if not all, of the bathrooms would be completed by mid-semester. As far as working to schedule, the university is one bathroom behind.

Jenkins: There is a severe cable problem due to wiring. In speaking with Dr. Smith, arrangements have been made for the problem to be rectified by the second week in February, and for resident's accounts to be credited for the time that has passed since the beginning of the semester.

#### Other Concerns

Gymnasium: Many students are concerned because they are unable to use the facilities in the health and wellness room or the gym (Memorial Hall). In a brief discussion with Dean Frederick (Arts and Sciences) and Dr. Smith, it was stated that wellness classes have already started in the wellness room. They are currently looking into extending the wellness hours and completing the final electrical work on the treadmills.

#### **International Students**

In several discussions, an international mural was suggested for international students. The idea has been taken into consideration; students will be kept up to date on any decisions.

#### LP: I Am (Nas) Columbia Records

It was Nasty Nas who shared his prophetic visions with the world on his classic debut Illmatic. It was the WuTang influenced pseudonym, Escobar, that introduced the Firm. As simply Nas, he tuned into the profound narrator within to showcase his maturity on his stellar second album It Was Written. Yet, with all of the characters Nas has presented, there's one that hasn't been fully bared, Nasir Jones. On his third LP, I Am, the king of Queensbridge takes an autobiographical theme to if not introduce; then further orient us with who Nas the person is, rather than just the rap-

I Am begins with him reliving the time in his mother's womb, while explaining the current and future effects of her conception on the globe, over a high pitched keyboard sample. He then reflects to his childhood, on "Papa Was A Playa," borrowing some R.Kelly lines to let his father know that he understands and accepts the gigolo in him because he is now a playa himself.

Nas still possesses the unique ability to view the world through rare lenses, with analysis and philosophies far beyond his years. A jazzy bass guitar, some piano droplets that can be felt in the listeners' arteries, and the voice of Ron Isley are used to explain why the sights out of Nasir's "Project Window" has him feeling "tired" and "uninspired." "I use to stare five stories down/ basketball courts shot up playgrounds/ an eye witness to murders and police shake Esco then strips his soul naked on "We Will Survive," two memorial letters to B.I.G. and Pac, which should've been recited over a slower track

Nas isn't just an M.C, he is a pure poet, writer, and storyteller. Although the amount of set up/murder tales get a little tiresome, tracks like "Small World" and "Undying Love" balance the wisdom of Aesop and the graphics of Kool G. Rap. 





1998 was a great year in sports. In the early portion of the year, two teams finally reached their goal in winning a championship. The 1997 Denver Broncos ended years of frustration by dethroning the Green Bay Packers as Super Bowl champions in Super Bowl XXXII. Denver QB John Elway, who lost on three previous trips to the big game, played like a man who wanted to win his first ring. Thanks to a great performance by Super Bowl XXXII Most Valuable Player RB Terrell Davis, the Denver Broncos could finally be called Super Bowl champions.

In college football, the 1997 Michigan Wolverines came into the 1997 college football season looking to regain some lost respect in the Big Ten Conference. Well, they did that and more. They won the Big Ten Conference and finished with an 11-0 record. In the Rose Bowl, the Wolverines beat the Washington State Huskies by 20-16 to win their first national championship since 1945.

They didn't win the national championship outright however. There was this team in Lincoln, Nebraska, called the Nebraska Cornhuskers. They were the national champions in 1994 and 1995. Both of those teams finished undefeated. The Cornhuskers crushed the Tennessee Volunteers in the Orange Bowl to grab a share of the national championship. In the 1990's, it was the third time the national championship went to two

In college basketball, there's no such thing as a "split national championship." Every year beginning around the middle of March, sixtyfour teams are summoned to do battle in the NCAA Tournament. All a team has to do is win six games to be called the national champion. The team that accomplished this feat in 1998 was the Kentucky Wildcats. Coach Orlando "Tubby" Smith became the first African American to be named head coach at the University of Kentucky. Keep in mind that at one time black players were not allowed to play under Coach Adolph Rupp at the time he was coaching the Wildcats. Guess where the Wildcats play their home games? Yup, you guessed it, Rupp Arena. Anyway, that's another story for another day. The Wildcats won their second championship in three seasons with two different head coaches. Indeed, it was definitely an accomplishment worth noting.

The National Basketball Association completed its 51st in April and the 16-team playoffs got underway in a heartbeat. There was something dif-ferent about the 1998 NBA playoffs. The Chicago Bulls, who had the best record in the league the previous two seasons, found themselves in a Game Seven of an Eastern Conference-final. In their five previous championship runs, this had never occurred. In fact, the last time Chicago played in a Game Seven of any kind was in the

1994 Eastern conference Semi-Finals against New York. The Bulls lost in one of the most competitive Game Seven's in recent memory. The opponent this time was the Indiana Pacers and first-year head coach Larry Bird. In 1994 and 1995, the Pacers lost two Game Seven battles on the road to New York and Orlando, respectively. This time around the Pacers played a tough game against the Bulls, but they ran into some guy named Michael Jordan. Guess how many times the Bulls have been eliminated on their home floor with Jordan playing? A grand total of three times. Mr. Jordan made sure this would not be number four.

Meanwhile, in the wild Western conference, the Utah Jazz ended the regular season with the 62-20 record, good for the overall home court advantage in the playoff. In the first round, they beat Houston three games to two in a terrific five game series. In that series, each team won one game on the other team's home court. The next two rounds were nothing more than speed bumps for Utah's well-oiled machine. They beat the San Antonio Spurs in five games and swept the L.A. Lakers in four games to get to the NBA Finals for the second consecutive year.

Once again the Bulls beat the Jazz in six games to win their sixth title in eight years. Is there any question who took the last shot for the Bulls? If there is, there ought to be an investigation immediately. Michael Jordan and the Chicago Bulls: quite simply, a match made in heaven.

The National Hockey League took on a strange look in the 1997-98 season. Star players like Paul Kariya of the Anaheim Mighty Ducks and Sergei Fedorov of the Detroit Red Wings sat out most of the season in contract disputes with their teams. Goal scoring was also down last season as Pittsburgh Penguins winger Jaromir Jagr was the only player to score 100 points in 1997-98. (Goals + Assists = Points) Buffalo Sabres goaltender Dominik Hasek was named the Hart Trophy winner as the league's most valuable player for the second season in a row. The Dallas Stars won the President's Trophy for having accumulated the most points in the league. (Win=2 points, Tie=1 point) All of this took a backseat to the Detroit Red Wings as they won the Stanley Cup for second consecutive season. The Philadelphia Flyers were swept in four games by Detroit in 1997. The Washington Capitals were also shown the door by way of the broom in 1998. Detroit's team captain Steve Yzermanwas named the winner of the Conn Smythe Trophy as the most valuable player in the playoffs.

The 1998 Major League Baseball season was, in one word: MONU-MENTAL! The three main stories of the season were the Home Run chase, the National League Wild-card race,

and the New York Yankees. In the beginning of the season, the major league single season record for home runs was 61. Roger Maris of the N.Y. Yankees established the mark in 1961. Mark McGwire won the Home Run chase with an unthinkable 70 home runs. Sammy Sosa came in second place with 66 home runs. If you didn't know, African-Americans make up the majority of athletes in the college and professional level. But what about in leadership and ownership positions? Compared to their Caucasian counterparts, the black head coaches in Division I bas-ketball coaches are Nolan Richard-son, Orlando "Tubby" Smith, Henry Bibby, "Bruiser" Flint, and Clem Haskins, for Arkansas, Kentucky, UMASS, and Minnesota respectively.

Race and sports relations have been a huge debate over the past few years. Some wonder if the two are connected. More and more African-Americans have been considered for head coaching positions, but not hired! With the millenium approaching, many critics and fans feel that African-Americans will be in an increasing number of leadership posi-

The black sports community just lost a great spokesman for the advancement of more African-American coaches. Georgetown University Head Coach John Thompson startled the sports world when he announced his resignation in early January because of personal reasons after 27 seasons with the Hoyas. He has coached many ex-Hoyas to NBA greatness such as New York Knick center Patrick Ewing and Miami Heat big man Alonzo Mourning. It marked the ending of a great career for Thompson and some say for the emergence of more African-Ameri-

can coaches. Thompson has definitely paved the way for countless black coaches in the present and future. He was the first African-American head coach to win a NCAA basketball title, when he led the Hoyas in 1984. And then ten years later, Nolan Richardson became the second African-American head coach to achieve that feat with the Arkansas Razorbacks.

But this problem has not just consumed college basketball, but also professional football and basketball. Out of 30 NFL teams Tony Dungy, Dennis Green, and Ray Rhodes are the only head African-American coaches for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Minnesota Vikings, and the Green Bay Packers, respectively. And the NBA is even worse. The only black head coach with a somewhat permanent position is the Atlanta Hawk's Lenny Wilkens.

Fellow coaches of Thompson feel that his resignation will spark the decrease in white dominance of coaching and sports teams ownership. They feel that the loss of a talented coach, like Thompson, can be a positive for minority coaches in every sport. According to the Associated Press, Richardson went on to say that Thompson was a leader, a trailblazer and someone who made many things possible for blacks.

Now the only thing left for the fans to do is just wait and see who fills the next vacant coaching posi-





## DSU Was Hereby Founded...

Delaware State University celebrated its annual Founder's Day in the Humanities building auditorium February 4th at 11:00 AM. As the name implies, this day is to commemorate the founders and history of DSU, from May 15th 1891 when the Delaware General Assembly passed an act establishing a college for "colored" students, to the summer of 1987 when Dr. Delauder was named president, and right up to the present time.

President Delauder was the first to speak on the occasion highlighting its importance, and was followed by the University Concert Choir, who gave a short musical selection. Dr. Claiborne Smith gave greetings on behalf of the Board of Trustees, and SGA President Dunston DeNoon also gave some words of inspiration. Mr. Albert S. Weal, Jr. represented the Alumni Association and in addition to greetings, he spoke of ideas for a student voter registra-

tion program, and on campus banking system.

President Delauder stood up once again, to introduce the main speaker: Dr. Bertice Berry, a distinguished author, artist and sociologist. Dr. Berry began by singing a short blues/"Negro spiritual" song about the current condition of the Black race in general. She made a number of valuable points. One such point was, "You stopped buying from the brother on the corner because Tommy Hilfiger sells stocking caps now," which is a reference to the poor Black economics.

One joke that she made was about sisters that don't want a brother that rides the bus. Dr. Berry asks them, "Excuse me, isn't that a transfer in your hand?!" (You had to be there). Dr. Berry pointed out that people who say they don't like to read need to get out because they're taking up space. "Not liking to read is like not liking to pee, you have to do it to live!"

Like many other speakers Dr.

Berry also used an old "ebonics" joke. Nonetheless most of the audience laughed quite hard. One student responded, "If I hear one more ebonics joke I'll get on stage and drag the speaker off myself. It's like alcohol; people don't know when to stop."

Dr. Berry made other points such as it being "anti-community if you have more shoes then you have books." Speaking of DSU, she said, "It is not here to find out who dresses the best. It is not here to find out who has the best hairstyle...Some of us are spending more time focusing on the outside of our head then the inside."

Hornet: From our understanding you're originally from North Delaware?
Yasmine: I went to William Penn

high school and grew up in a neighborhood called the woods. I was there before Christiana Mall was there.

Hornet: You said for the first three years of "Mad Rhythms" existence you weren't seeing any money, so what happened by the fourth year?

Yasmine: Well, what happens is magazines like XXL come out owned by other people, and that's fine, but all the profits we own and they come to me. My first three years I couldn't come out glossy. I was about 16 pages and now it's like 24. What I would do was whatever money I made I would reinvest it so I could print out an issue. Then I would send all my magazines to all the heads,

music, fashion, film; every time they call me, they would be like 'Your magazine looks better'. So it came up on that level.

H: So how did you learn the publishing part of the publication field, since we both know that's where the real money

Y: Exactly, first you have to see how other people are doing it, 'cause I never wanted to be a magazine that was owned by somebody else. I was like if I got to put in my blood, sweat, and tears I'm going to own it myself. So what I would do was I would look at all these different publications and be like "O.K., what kind of paper is this?" I would call the local papers and be like "Well, I have a magazine. Can I bring it by?" and they would say, 'Well this is 50 pound weight, this is saddle wood', and so and so. So they would basically teach me all of their terms by talking to me. I learned I couldn't come out 100 pages or couldn't come out gloss because gloss is much

more expensive. I started where I could afford which was newspaper print, black and white, and one color. Then I would cut and paste. I even followed the Dave Maze story of how at first nobody was giving him his respect so he made the people feel what he was doing.

H: So what is the difference between a Madd Rhythms and a Vibe, and what do you have to do to get to that Vibe level?

Y: In your first three years if you don't have somebody like Vibe, who basically started off of Time Warner's money, you have all of these advertisers who don't want to touch you because they aren't familiar with you. When you have those companies like a Time Warner backing you, they already have those relationships. They already have their ad people placed and agency contacts. That's why Vibe and Blaze can come out so thick. They'll say, since y'all are already buying Vibe we'll give you a

discount on Blaze. They already have a lump of money, where as they aren't even really budgeting. Myself has to be like "well I made 20, 000 so I can't spend 25, 000. Every dime has to be accounted for. The other publications can afford to have a bad month, because they have money behind them. We can't afford to have a bad month. In another two years I'm going to be on the same level as the Vibe.

H: How do you feel about being a female journalist in the Virginia area?

Y: Well Virginia is pretty slow and they aren't the most hip-hop supportive people, so a lot of our journalists are from N.Y, Chicago, and L.A. I'm head-quartered there because it's a cost issue and because I'm close to school, but

### **Black Inventors Exhibit Returns**

Benjamin Banneker once said, "The color of the skin is in no way connected with strength of the mind or intellectual powers." Proof of this is shown in the Black inventors' exhibit, which came to Delaware State University on February 4, 1999, in the Martin Luther King Jr. Student Center Auditorium.

The tour, which visits 30 collèges, including Delaware State University, Hampton, Morgan, and Old Dominion University, aspires to enlighten students on the achievements of African-Americans throughout history.

James Ince, director of the Black Inventors' Exhibit, stated, "There would be no America without the achievements of African Americans. Africans were inventors, lawyers and doctors... and literally built America. The first settlers were unskilled. Native Americans and Africans helped the White settlers, who probably would not have survived."


The Black Inventions Exhibit exists to prove to young people that African

Americans have made valuable contributions to American society, and to educate those ignorant of African-American achievements.

Some of the African-American inventions on display include the telephone transmitter, created by Granville T. Woods in 1884; the straightening comb, by Madame C. J. Walker, 1905; the gas mask, created by Garrett Morgan in 1914; the cellular car phone, created by Henry T. Sampson in 1971; and the shower wall & bathtub mounted back washer, invented by Mary B. Kenner, 1987.

Other achievements mentioned included those by Africans, such as the creation of chess, the alphabet, and civilization; and the creation of the world's fastest supercomputer, which can handle 3.1 billion calculations per second, created by Philip Emeagwali.

Reaction to the exhibit was overwhelmingly positive, leaving students stunned by the idea that their ancestors were capable of such genius, or more importantly that they were unaware of such accomplishments by their own people.

Hornet: You said for the first three years of "Mad Rhythms" existence you weren't seeing any money, so what happened by the fourth year?

Yasmine: Well, what happens is magazines like XXL come out owned by other people, and that's fine, but all the profits we own and they come to me. My first three years I couldn't come out glossy. I was about 16 pages and now it's like 24. What I would do was whatever money I made I would reinvest it so I could print out an issue. Then I would send all my magazines to all the heads,

music, fashion, film; every time they call me, they would be like 'Your magazine looks better'. So it came up on that level.

H: So how did you learn the publishing part of the publication field, since we both know that's where the real money

Y: Exactly, first you have to see how other people are doing it, 'cause I never wanted to be a magazine that was owned by somebody else. I was like if I got to put in my blood, sweat, and tears I'm going to own it myself. So what I would do was I would look at all these different publications and be like "O.K., what kind of paper is this?" I would call the local papers and be like "Well, I have a magazine. Can I bring it by?" and they would say, 'Well this is 50 pound weight, this is saddle wood', and so and so. So they would basically teach me all of their terms by talking to me. I learned I couldn't come out 100 pages or couldn't come out gloss because gloss is much

more expensive. I started where I could afford which was newspaper print, black and white, and one color. Then I would cut and paste. I even followed the Dave Maze story of how at first nobody was giving him his respect so he made the people feel what he was doing.

H: So what is the difference between a Madd Rhythms and a Vibe, and what do you have to do to get to that Vibe level?

Y: In your first three years if you don't have somebody like Vibe, who basically started off of Time Warner's money, you have all of these advertisers who don't want to touch you because they aren't familiar with you. When you have those companies like a Time Warner backing you, they already have those relationships. They already have their ad people placed and agency contacts. That's why Vibe and Blaze can come out so thick. They'll say, since y'all are already buying Vibe we'll give you a

discount on Blaze. They already have a lump of money, where as they aren't even really budgeting. Myself has to be like "well I made 20, 000 so I can't spend 25, 000. Every dime has to be accounted for. The other publications can afford to have a bad month, because they have money behind them. We can't afford to have a bad month. In another two years I'm going to be on the same level as the Vibe.

H: How do you feel about being a female journalist in the Virginia area?

Y: Well Virginia is pretty slow and they aren't the most hip-hop supportive people, so a lot of our journalists are from N.Y, Chicago, and L.A. I'm head-quartered there because it's a cost issue and because I'm close to school, but

### **Black Inventors Exhibit Returns**

Benjamin Banneker once said, "The color of the skin is in no way connected with strength of the mind or intellectual powers." Proof of this is shown in the Black inventors' exhibit, which came to Delaware State University on February 4, 1999, in the Martin Luther King Jr. Student Center Auditorium

The tour, which visits 30 collèges, including Delaware State University, Hampton, Morgan, and Old Dominion University, aspires to enlighten students on the achievements of African-Americans throughout history.

James Ince, director of the Black Inventors' Exhibit, stated, "There would be no America without the achievements of African Americans. Africans were inventors, lawyers and doctors... and literally built America. The first settlers were unskilled. Native Americans and Africans helped the White settlers, who probably would not have survived."


The Black Inventions Exhibit exists to prove to young people that African

Americans have made valuable contributions to American society, and to educate those ignorant of African-American achievements.

Some of the African-American inventions on display include the telephone transmitter, created by Granville T. Woods in 1884; the straightening comb, by Madame C. J. Walker, 1905; the gas mask, created by Garrett Morgan in 1914; the cellular car phone, created by Henry T. Sampson in 1971; and the shower wall & bathtub mounted back washer, invented by Mary B. Kenner, 1987.

Other achievements mentioned included those by Africans, such as the creation of chess, the alphabet, and civilization; and the creation of the world's fastest supercomputer, which can handle 3.1 billion calculations per second, created by Philip Emeagwali.

Reaction to the exhibit was overwhelmingly positive, leaving students stunned by the idea that their ancestors were capable of such genius, or more importantly that they were unaware of such accomplishments by their own people.

### The Strife Of A Double Life

"I have lived my entire life in an all black neighborhood, attended an all black elementary school, junior high and high school and I'm quite sure I couldn't get any more black," said Robert Meadows a junior at Norfolk State University. The question then becomes; is it necessary to attend an HBCU after being raised around all blacks?

Meadows affirms, as many others do, that attending a Historically Black Institution helps him maintain a certain level of comfort. Nia Daniels, President of African American Student Organization the Mercer County Community College in New Jersey, stated that it seems students who attend HBCU's take for granted what she and African American students who attend white universities fight for everyday. She claims that although the versatility is there, the roots of African Americans are left to be explored by student organizations rather than an entire atmosphere as that of an HBCU.

"This is another reason that African Americans should attend HBCU's; it should lay a foundation of confidence and solidarity that we can take back to our communities and use to build them up," mentioned Meadows.

For many who face the same situation, this can be a problem, said Vangroove of Urbanworld Entertainment. He attended an HBCU and transferred to Albany State University of New York. Vangroove said that because he came from that type of lifestyle, going to Albany State was an absolute culture shock. When asked the question, "How do you adjust or deal with the shift from the all black majority at an HBCU to the black minority in a white workforce?" Vangroove stated, "You just gotta jump right in!" He also added that all black people should have at least two or three white friends.

At a recent Communications forum at Howard University one member of the local NABJ chapter recognized the need for internships. She said, "Get into big name main stream firms--have a black focus as well as a mainstream focus." She also said that it has a lot to do with attitude. She declared, "You must know who you are and have the ability to get the job done because we carry the burden of our entire community with us." Stacey Spikes, CO-Founder and Executive Director of Urbanworld Entertainment and former manager of such groups as Boyz II Men before his concentration on film, affirmed that we as African Americans have always had to live a double life.

He maintained that we have this innate ability to "switch up" when necessary. Spikes and Vangroove assert that confidence plays a key role in this transition from majority to minority.

Some other ways to cope with the transition that were mentioned at the forum are to know your strengths and weaknesses. Also be persistent, develop a specialty and be able to keep up on a wide range of current issues. Other key factors are to learn how things work, seek a mentor and become a mentor.

### A Tribute To The Father

After a year of teaching, the Father was locked up and sentenced to Mattawan Mental Hospital, in Becon, N.Y., for teaching that the black man was God. He spent two years in Beacon for teaching what he believed in, before being signed out in 1967 when the hospital's doctors listened to him and established he didn't have a mental disorder. In 1967 he was signed out and continued his teachings.

When Allah came home he established a great friendship with NYC Mayor John V. Lindsay, who called on the Father to help instill peace between the Black and Jewish community, during their racial tension.

The Father was praised by Lindsay, and some city officials for his action which opened the door for the nation. In the summer of that year Mayor Lindsay granted the nation a youth academy. It was named "Allah's School in Mecca" and still stands to this day on 126th Street and 7th Avenue in Harlem. The building was leased to the nation for a one-dollar lease each


Once the school was running smooth in 1968, the Father told the youth the name "Five Percent Nation" would be changed to "The Nation of the Gods and Earth's." He also let them know not to sulk over his death and that life must go on if he were to die.

One year later, on June 12, 1969 the Father was fatally shot seven times in the elevator of the M.L.K. towers

in East Harlem. Although the nation was hurt by his death they remembered Allah telling them they were the most high when some considered them the most low. The nation also kept in mind that life must go on after his death and the Father will never die mentally, he will be in the minds of people throughout the uni-

The legacy that he left will live through the "Nation of the Gods and Earth's". The growth of the nation is expanding every second the planet rotates. Everyday Allah is seen and heard. ## "Fighting for a Living Wage"

According to most economists and corporate investors, 1998 was a banner year for capitalism. Rebounding from its disastrous decline last summer, the stock market roared back to a record 16 percent gain for the year. The stock market had netted even higher gains in the previous three years, above 20 percent annually. This means that more than two trillion dollars in equity has been produced at least on paper in this recent bull market.

Economists like to point out that 150 million Americans are invested in the stock market, mostly through their retirement plans, pensions, and individual stock accounts. What this fails to add is that the lions share of this wealth is owned by a very small number of individuals. Statistically, about 10 percent of the U.S. population owns or controls more than 70 percent of the nations total wealth. That figure includes all stocks, bonds, real estate, and all assets of any kind. The top one percent of the U.S. population actually owns about 40 percent of all wealth. Simple arithmetic tells us that the overwhelming majority of Americans, the ninety percent that have less than 30 percent of the capital and resources, have very different lives than most at the top. It is in this latter group that one finds nearly all: African Americans, Latinos, singleparent households, working class and poor people.

The great majority of American citizens have no expectations or aspirations for great wealth and opulence. We have nothing in common with the televised "lifestyles of the rich and shameless." We pay our bills setting aside money to buy a home or to put our children through college. Those of us fortunate

enough to have job security can plan for our retirement, and perhaps even take a vacation once a year. To achieve these modest goals takes at least a "living wage," the basic level of income necessary to provide the most basic personal consumption needs of a family of four: food, housing, transportation, utilities, clothing, taxes, and co-payments for health care and child care. A commitment to a living wage should guarantee Medicare benefits to all workers, from their initial date of employment through the end of the periods covered by Unemployment Insurance, plus coverage for their spouses, partners and dependent children.

Unfortunately, despite the billions of dollars generated on Wall Street, the capitalist economy has conspicuously failed to produce living wage jobs for millions of Americans. A recent study by the National Priorities Project, in collaboration with Jobs With Justice, illustrates the problem by focusing on New York. The study first determined that a truly livable annual wage for a family of four in New York, using the criteria outlined above, was about \$36,600. Using this wage benchmark, the study found that 70 percent of the jobs with the most growth in New York pay less than the livable wage. Keep in mind that the livable wage is about one-third less than the average family income in New York State. This means that the livable wage is essentially a subsistence budget, with little or no money for "luxuries."

Clerical supervisors in New York earn an average wage of \$27, 872, or approximately three-fourths of the livable wage. Other occupations at less than the livable wage include janitors and cleaners, \$21,320 (58 percent of the livable wage); receptionists, \$20,342 (56 percent); and teachers aides, \$19,261(53 percent).

Beneath this group of workers are those whom sociologist William Julius Wilson described as the "truly disadvantaged." These are millions of working people whose wages are actually below the federal government's poverty level, which is now about \$14,248. The typical food preparation worker earns only \$11,939 a year, about 33 percent of a livable wage, and well below the official poverty level. Cashiers in New York receive average wages of \$11,586, waiters and waitresses, \$11,336.

These economic trends in New York are shared throughout the country. For the bottom 80 percent of all wage earners, real hourly wages have fallen steadily, about 20 percent in the last 25 years. Conditions are predictably worse for African-American workers. By 1995, almost 40 percent of Black workers earned less than poverty level wages.

What is to be done? Since the capitalist economy and Wall Street clearly cannot produce jobs at livable wages, we need to take matters into our own hands. All over the country, more than a dozen cities have passed "living wage ordinances." We must support state referenda that would raise the minimum wage. But perhaps the most important reform would be to close the vast gap between the salaries of the corporate elite vs. most working people. What about limiting the corporate tax deductibility of executive compensation to 25 times that of the lowestpaid full-time worker in a business? Any amount of executive pay over that level would be subject to taxation, saving millions of dollars. The time for economic justice is long overdue. The fight for a living wage must be taken both to Wall Street and Congress.

## A Cure for AIDS?

### The answer is in the rain forest

Africa's ancient rain forests could be the most important source of new medical information as we enter into the new millennium. University of Alabama at Birmingham scientist Dr. Bertrice Hahn recently concluded a study demonstrating that a particular subspecies of chimpanzee is almost certainly the source of HIV 1. Scientists also believe that this discovery may help us find potential cures and treatments for AIDS, but finding these elusive answers depends on an ongoing study of the chimpanzee in its natural habitat.

But the rain forest that is home to these chimpanzees is being cut down by industrial logging companies; the chimpanzees themselves are being killed to feed the logging crews, and for meat to sell in urban markets. Unless we can stop this destruction, we run the risk of losing treatments and cures for AIDS before they can be discovered. The chimpanzee is 98 percent genetically identical to humans, but apparently it does not die from its version of HIV. We need to figure out why that is. The answer is in the rain forest.

As individuals and as a nation there are things we can do to protect the health of Africa's rain forests, and their animal and human inhabitants.

First of all, we can refuse to purchase wood or wood based products that are made of old-growth rain forest wood. If we don't buy it, they won't cut it down. Some commonly available African hardwoods include African mahogany, ironwood and bloodwood.

Then, we need to work together to defeat the African Trade and Development Bill that President Clinton previewed in his State of the Union

Despite the promising sound of its name, this legislation is not about "development" in any sustainable sense of the word. Rather, "NAFTA for Africa" would give transnational corporations and African government fat cats carte blanche to cut down the remaining forests for quick profit. Afterwards, the forests that most Africans still depend on for sustenance will be gone, creating

additional hardships for millions of people, and there will be no chimpanzee habitat for AIDS scientists to study.

In the past ten years such policies have already allowed logging interests to cut down an area of rain forest the size of Florida, and carve roads into previously inaccessible forest regions. We're lucky that we haven't already entirely wiped out the home of the chimpanzees that may hold the cure for AIDS, but we can't expect our luck to hold out forever.

We do have other legislative options. Illinois Congressman Jesse Jackson Jr. has proposed an alternative to Clinton's rain forest death warrant. His Human rights, Opportunity, Partnership and Empowerment (HOPE) for Africa Bill calls for debt relief, so countries will not need to liquidate their forests to pay international debt, and allows African countries to develop economic and social policy free from outside med-

Dr. Hahn's discovery about the source of HIV 1 holds a promise for the future, and a warning. Rain forests are indeed the world's medicine chest, but if we're going to save them we need to act

The Rainforest Action Network works to protect the Earth's rain forests and support the rights of their inhabitants to education, grass-roots organizing, and nonviolent direct action.














### **Prevention Today Keeps Prescriptions Away**

The Delaware State University Student Nursing Club held a blood/sugar screening February 8 in the MLK building lobby. It's part of a community project for all the nursing schools in Delaware to help bring awareness that diabetes is not just an elderly disease.

The theme for this screening was "Caring for our community." The Nursing club's efforts have been on making the community more aware of some of the health issues it faces. Nursing Club President Mrs. Linda Dixon-Victor has noticed that young people need this type of program "I've found in my personal experience that many people especially the younger generation are not aware of the disease that can effect them if they don't do the proper preventative mea-

Diabetes effects 2.3 million Blacks according to the American Diabetes Association. Diabetes does not seem to vary amongst gender, but as for race Asians suffer from it the least. Blacks and Hispanics seem most susceptible. If

caught early diabetes can be controlled.

The blood/sugar test takes less than five seconds. The patient's finger is cleaned with alcohol, and slight pressure is applied to bring blood into the tip. A tiny disposable needle housed in a plastic sleeve makes a quick and hardly noticeable prick. A drop of blood is placed on a small strip of special paper, inserted into a calculator-sized reader and you're done.

A healthy blood/sugar level is between 80 and 120. If you're above that you should have another test done after fasting since it will be more reliable. Below 80 means you need to eat. A high reading doesn't necessarily mean diabetes. You may have just eaten a lot of carbohydrates like pasta, which raises the level in your body.

There are plans to offer another screening sometime in the future at one of the basketball games. The Nursing Club would like to thank everyone who supported them, especially the Roach Diagnostic Corp. who supplied the materials. Prevention is the key, so get tested before it's too late.

## Seeking Community Heroes...

Americans worked an average of four hours a week at churches, schools, hospitals, museums or, informally, an elderly neighbor's home. Volunteerism should teach amazing, important lessons; it should not be or feel like an oblig-

Since the government cannot solve all the nation's social ills, volunteers are needed to help. There are many things that you can do as a volunteer. You can mentor to school children, read to younger children, be a big sister/brother, help the homeless, help battered women, or teach adults how to read. You do not have to commit much; you can volunteer from one hour to as many times as you want. Remember, you are the one volunteering - you do not have to commit to a project that is not right for you. Some volunteer agencies screen charities that need volunteer help on the basis of whether these groups offer "user friendly" activities to draw volunteers. Many of the charities deal with children, animals and/or one-time or shortterm activities, the Los Angeles Times reports.

The New York group (New York Cares), for example, uses computer tracking to find which volunteers are drawn to which causes, and how frequently they help out.

The chapter then uses this information to let the volunteers know about related activities, reports the Los Angeles Times.

#### Steps to becoming

- a volunteer:
- 1. First decide what you would like to do, based on experience or just simply attraction.
- 2. Research, by looking in your local phone book or on the Internet, for the volunteer agency or organization of your choice.

After you have decided to volunteer, make sure that you choose an organization that in the area of

- 3. Make sure that you are fully trained by the organization of your choice, before you start volunteering. The training session is usually an hour and that is the best place to get-to-know other newly baptized volunteers and to ask as many questions, about your responsibility as a volunteer, as you can.
- 4. Keep in mind that good intentions may not be enough. Many volunteer agencies cannot

absorb a lot of untrained volunteers, and most put volunteers through vetting and training, especially if they intend to deal with children.

5. After your orientation, you are usually supervised an experienced volunteer where you can feel comfortable and bring up any concerns.

After you begin volunteering, do not feel obligated. You can volunteer with different organizations or projects until you have found the right one for you.

This helps you become more comfortable with volunteering because you have many options, you'll know you're needed, and you don't have to commit to being available (for example) every Thursday at 5:00 p.m.

People have different reasons for volunteering and different levels of commitment and availability. Plus there are endless projects and organizations so nearly anyone who wants to help can find something that fits him or her.

Volunteering is a blessing for it gives an individual the opportunity to help others. The feeling that an individual gets after volunteering cannot be expressed in words. The only thing I can say is that it definitely puts a SMILE on one's

## Black Love

The Delaware State University Chapter of the NAACP held it's second annual Celebration of Black Love February 10th in the MLK glass lounge.

Although the dates are close, Chapter President Latoya Stephens emphasized that the forum was not connected to Valentine's Day.

The flyer said the program begins at 7:00 PM sharp with three exclamation marks after sharp. By no means was this valid. 7:27 sharp!!! would have been more accurate. The candle in the center of the table was nearly halfway spent before it began.

The program began with the Star Spangled Banner followed by the first speaker, Second term councilman in Wilmington Mr. Norman Oliver. Oliver, a former Delaware State University SGA president, spoke on the importance of Black people getting important positions in society, so that you have the ability to change things for the better.

"If you have a voice and can say it, don't sit there idle." Oliver admitted to keeping up with current

events at DSU and never being to busy for the students here.

He told a story about seeing a Black female hit by a car while crossing DuPont Highway, and pointed out that The University of Delaware has an above the ground crosswalk.

Oliver said the excuse for not building a similar crosswalk for DSU is that "it would block the Dover Mall sign."

Changing the subject he spoke on the bashing one student received at a recent party. He highlighted that Blacks are quick to yell "White man!" but much of the violence is Black on Black. "I don't think it was a KKK that went and bashed his head, I think it was someone he

After Mr. Oliver, some student poetry was recited. Three of the poets were Andrea Hicks, Jason Armstead who said "Without consciousness true love can never exist" and Oluseyi Sofola (shofy). Shofy represented the Yoruba tribe of West Africa. Before reciting his poems he gave thanks to his ancestors, the Yoruba Gods and Goddesses.

This lost some of the audience's attention, and since he was not talking about Christianity some ignored him. Shofy said he was trying to help others find the Gods and Goddesses with themselves.

When asked about the audience's response he said; "I think it was mixed. Some can accept getting back to more African lifestyles while others prefer Western. For some it's too radical, they think they can't have what they have now and live with it.'

Shofy also spoke of how Haiti (formerly St. Dominique) is the first and only Black nation to emerge from slavery through a revolution. 'Yoruba have always been able to free themselves from adversity."

Wayne Stackhouse commented that "Shofy shows the diversity in our people." And he gave a blessing before the food was served.

The main speaker was Mr. Hasani Pettiford. Pettiford began with a story of the history of Valentine's Day and the significance of the heart shaped boxes of chocolate. After that, his speech was no holds

He spoke about how lust has replaced love, and respect in college, "Lust and self-gratification have become the core curriculum...Some of us are graduating with our PHD 'pimp and hoe degree'."

Pettiford further described the lust... "Grabbing on breasts, and [male genitalia] and [female genitalia] and not knowing who they belong to ... A lot of sisters will crack their legs open for every Tom, Dick, and Harry especially Dick!"

Pettiford said that we are living in a sex driven society that accepts abnormal behavior as normal "If a pastor speaks against homosexuality he's [considered] living in old

Sex has also permeated hip-hop music. "Foxxy Brown gives the real Foxxy Brown-Pam Grier-a bad name...'Ill Nanna,' she's telling you what she's got!" As for Lil' Kim he said, "We moved from Queen Nzinga to Queen B."

Pettiford received a standing ovation as he finished with "Brothers you need to respect Black women. Black women, you need to respect Black men. Black women you need to respect yourself; that's revolutionary...Some say knowledge is power, but I don't believe it. The application of knowledge is


## DSU Professor Publishes Book On African American Education In Delaware

Dr. Bradley Skelcher, a professor of history and political science at Delaware State University, has completed a book that focuses on the struggle to establish public education for African Americans in the state of Delaware after the Civil War. The release of the book, titled "African American education in Delaware: A History Through Photographs, 1865-1930" will be celebrated by a reception and book signing on Friday, February 26 at noon in the DSU Arts Center/Gallery. The book was published by the Delaware Heritage Commission.

"The book was initially inspired by the efforts of the Delaware Historic Preservation Office to formulate a plan to believe that photographs could tell much of the story unrevealed by words. Therefore, I included many of the photographs in the collections of the Hagley Museum and Library in Wilmington, Delaware and the Delaware Public Archives in Dover. It is my hope that a combination of the narrative and photographs will extensively tell the story of the struggle of African Americans in the state to establish public school education for their children.'

According to Dr. Skelcher, the book can be used at any level of education in the state and that it was written for general readership. He plans to have the book distributed to all of the public schools in Delaware.

Dr. Skelcher, who has been teaching at DSU since 1990, received his doctorate, master's, and bachelor's degree in history from southern Illinois University at Carbondale. He has written several articles and contributed to numerous books on the topic of historic preservation.



## Urban World Film Festival

On Monday, February 1, 1999, The Urban World Film Festival (UWFF) visited Delaware State University (DSU). The festival, which is presented by HBO, is an outlet developed by Stacy Spikes to help African-American films gain exposure. This event was held in the Student Center Auditorium and was sponsored by the Office of Student Activities, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc., and the Women's Senter

In three years, since this festival's conception, this year is the first year it has promoted a college tour. Spikes, Founder and Executive Director of UWFF, says, "We implemented College Tour '99 to expose the invisible market of African-American films to a younger audience." College Tour '99 will visit 23 universities, mainly Historically Black Colleges and Universities and institutions with film schools. DSU was the first school visited on this tour.

The event consisted of two short films and two full-length films. Author and filmmaker, Nelson George contributed the first short film, *To Be A Black Man*. This film lasted approximately six minutes and was narrated by Samuel L. Jackson. This piece speaks of the joys and hardships experienced by black men.

Mixing Nia, a full-length film, is a story about a biracial woman who is working on a novel and is trying to find her identity at the same time. The film was written and directed by Alison Swan and starred Karyn Parsons, who is best known for her role as Hillary on the sitcom, Fresh Prince of Bel-Air.

Jorge, a black-and-white short film, is about a shy man who is looking for love. The film takes place mainly in the workplace where Jorge is trying desperately to catch the attention of a new co-worker he has met previously. The film was written and directed by Joel Hopkins.

Detention, a film by Darryl LeMont Wharton, is about a teacher who brings together five students after school in order to inspire them to rise from their current conditions. The students are faced with problems such as drugs, family issues, homosexuality, premarital sex, teenage pregnancy, and violence.

Students had good comments about the film festival. Sophomore Zach Smith, an Education major, said, "Without the support of huge corporations, the independent film industry is doing extravagant." Rashaan Torian, a freshman Marketing major and native of Baltimore, MD says his favorite film was *Detention*. "It portrayed a realistic view of life in a Baltimore City school system.

During the 1998-1999 school year, more than 143,000 students will receive Keystone Rewards student loans totaling nearly \$750 million.

For the second academic year, PHEAA also has eliminated the one percent guarantee fee normally charged to insure more than 500,000 student loans processed through the agency.

Many consider Black Moon's first album, "Enta Da Stage," a Hip-Hop classic, the reason being the chemistry between some granite like Beatminerz music and the nasty mic techniques of a crooklynite shorty called Buckshot. The group's split kept die hard Moon fans craving for a reentry to the stage, but Buckshot, 5 ft, and Evil Dee have fought through the clouds of turmoil to reunite and deliver the five year awaited LP, "War

The album continues where "Enta..." left off with Buck sounding


like Buckshot Shorty over the arabic sounds of "Whirl Wind" and the heavy bass-lined "Onslaught." 5 ft even steps up his mic value over the outer space sounds on the title track and the Heather B hyped "All Y'all Niggas." The Moon even glows over Brownsville as M.O.P holds a sinister bass line for hostage on "Anialation."

"Enta's.." success first attributed to it's music's potency, but this is vacant in "War Zone." Too much of its production, like the Louieville Sluggahed "Come Get Some" and the Cocoa B scented "Shake Your Frame," walk the borderline between phat and wack. Beats like the J.B classic "Buddy" and Kool G's "Take 'Em to War" are borrowed for "Two Turn Tables and a

Mic" and "One, Two," while the best track on the album, an "Evil Dee Mix," isn't even rhymed on.

Another absent element from their debut are the energy enhanced mosse hooks which have been replaced by Buckshot's lame self attempts exemplified on the "War Zone" sounding "Weight of the World" and "Throw Your Hands In the Air."

It definitely isn't easy to perfectly match a classic album, but there is no reason to fall as short in duplication as Black Moon did with this LP. The recipe shouldn't be xeroxed, but there are certain ingredients, like innovative production and changeable flows, that are essential for the phatness of any album



should show qualifications, dedication, representation and communication." She was able to highlight herqualifications, which include a 3.82 GPA and involvement in numerous campus organizations. If elected, she promises to have posted office hours that will allow students to visit her, to address the DSU community regularly through the Hornet and other campus media, and to address the relationship between the city of Dover and DSU. She stressed that this relationship has to be addressed because, "We are employees and consumers in Dover's stores.

The second candidate to speak was Lenise DuBouse. DuBouse, a junior majoring in animal science, is from Rosedale (Queens), NY. If elected as the next Miss DSU, DuBouse would like to change selfexpression through communication and plans to have an open door policy, which will allow her to meet with the DSU community. DuBouse is also interested in promoting a celebration titled Unity Day. "This day allows all of the cultures to come together as one," she added. She closed her speech by stating, "By teaching change, we are contributing to the DSU community

The third candidate for the title of Miss DSU was Tiffany Scott. Scott, a junior from Wilmington, DE, has had many accolades during her enrollment at Delaware State University. Included in these accolades are the titles of Miss Freshman '96-'97, sophomore class treasurer '97-'98, Miss Black and Gold '98-99, and Vice President of the Ufumbuzi Players drama club. Scott is also a participant in a Big Brothers/Big Sisters program. "Allow me to lead you into the next millenium," she told the audience. When referring to the institution, she stated, "We have a beauty." Scott said she is focused on students exercising their rights and coming together. "We will be much better off as students and people," she added. Scott, who is known for wearing a butterfly pin, describes herself as a caterpillar when she first enrolled in DSU as a freshman in 1996. "My butterfly is an indication that I am about to spread my wings."

The final candidate for Miss DSU was Gina Upshaw. A native of Philadelphia, PA, Upshaw is a junior majoring in education. Upshaw expressed to the audience her meaning of Miss DSU. "Miss DSU is not about riding in a float," she said. "It's about improving campus life, making DSU a better place and innovating and implementing state of the art programs...I will make an impact. I will make a difference."

The last portion of the evening allowed the two parties running for SGA, Ex-Factor and NEXT to speak. Each member was allowed a two minute speech. Among Ex-Factor's goals were helping DSU regain

respect in the community, creating school programs that involve self expression, addressing how school funds are being used, boosting morale of all students, and implementing 24-hour visitation.

Among the goals of the NEXT party were correspondence to the Hornet, WDSU Radio and TV, and student discounts in the Dover Mall and throughout other businesses in Dover. NEXT's candidate for President, Dunstan DeNoon has already served as SGA President this year. When addressing a student's question about monetary issues, he responded, "The doors [of SGA] are always open...we have no fear to discuss anything!" and proceeded to distribute copies of this year's SGA budget and how the money was spent.

With all of the advertising of Miss DSU and SGA on campus, Speech Night was a prime opportunity for students to see for themselves what the candidates had to offer and to make their own opinions of the most qualified candidates.


Bonsu: What does electing Kisha Barnett as Miss DSU mean to Del-State?

## Financial Security and Black Economics

I've never heard of a self-employed plumber getting the pink slip, but I know that thousands of corporate workers are being laid off daily. Downsizing and layoffs are at an all time high especially because of all the company mergers. However, as long as there's a busted faucet plumbers will always have a job.

What would you do if you were suddenly laid off without any source of income to back you up? We've all heard of champion athletes needing something to fall back on, so why doesn't this apply to 9 to 5ers as well?

In reality the only truly stable jobs are skilled labor such as plumbing, carpentry and similar. If the average "Walter White-collar" loses his job as an executive, most likely he will be stuck eating dehydrated macaroni and cheese collecting unemployment for a year or two until he can find another job, if he ever does

Conversely there is "Andy Ambitious." If he loses his job he will still have a comfortable income coming in. Why? Because Mr. Ambitious is like a well rounded athlete. Knowing that jobs are not guaranteed, Andy learned carpentry skills in addition to his corporate knowledge.

So instead of doing nothing while waiting for job interviews, Andy is making \$30 per hour building stairs and repairing window frames. Contrary to what some might think, these skilled labor jobs are totally stable, high paying, and always in demand, simply

because there is a shortage of people who have the skills.

Having an education in a skilled labor field is a must for anyone who wants security in their financial future, whether it's as a locksmith, carpenter, plumber, or electronics technician.

Additionally, skilled labor education can improve Black economics. If a chain of trade schools were opened around the country in inner city areas, offering quality instruction, low cost tuition, and job placement services. Then poor Blacks would have the opportunities to learn useful job skills.

This idea is not to limit Blacks to blue collar jobs, but since most poverty stricken families can not afford a college education, correspondence study is sure better than nothing. So while this generation is full of carpenters the next generation can afford a college education. This is the same plan poor Italian immigrants used to raise their societal status.

It'd be nice to think that some Black leader(s) out there would put this idea into practice, but for some reason I doubt this will happen with any of the present "leaders".

The next step to strong Black economics is business ownership. When Blacks start learning these job skills it is vital that they receive the permits necessary to start their own business. I've seen dozens of cases where Hispanic men (usually Mexican) come to the U.S., buy a couple lawnmowers, leaf blowers, and whatever and start their own landscaping companies. As a mat-

ter of fact, you may have noticed that a Hispanic landscaping crew works here

Much of the money they earn is sent back to Mexico, and with the current foreign exchange rates their families live like kings. Meanwhile they're also buying houses in the U.S.

You can't tell me that Blacks can't implement this same plan to move out the projects. Instead, the projects are embraced, and you have other Blacks like Eddie Murphy making jokes about living in them with his clay animation series "The PJs." This is the same stupidity that gets Blacks to embrace the "N" word.

Finally, the third step to strong Black economics is patronizing Black businesses. I know first hand that this can be a farce. After 20 something years of executive work my father decided for work for himself and start a landscaping company (no he wasn't laid off for those wondering) dubbed Motherland Landscaping. Business is surely booming but there is a very sad/twisted/demented/"Uncle Tom-ish" (I could go on) fact about its finances.

The fact is that out of all the dozens of customers the Blacks are clearly the most critical, and even though they have the money, the slowest to pay. However, from conversations with the clients and their former contractors, we found that they gladly paid White contractors a 10-15% higher fee for average to below grade work, and often without complaints. Woe unto the Black race. Many things need to change.

## Is it time to close our borders?

Why is the federal government encouraging mass immigration? One million legal - and 1/2 million illegal - immigrants are pouring into the United States every year.

This question occurred to me as I read a long article about 75,000 Hmong (pronounced Mung) now living in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area.

Is the federal government trying to foster cultural diversity? If so, they couldn't have picked a more "diverse" group than the Hmong to move into the virtually all-white state of Min-

According to the article, the Hmong come from primitive villages in the mountains of Laos. They fought with the United States in the Vietnam War. In return, the CIA promised to move the Hmong to the U.S. after the war ended.

How primitive are the Hmong? The article reported that they lived in such isolation that, when they saw airplanes, they examined the undersides of the plane to determine the plane's sex.

In their native Laotian mountains, the Hmong live in huts with mud floors. They practice animal sacrifice, using hogs, cattle, and chickens. These animals are killed indoors.

Transplanted to the United States,

the Hmong have continued this ritual practice in the living rooms of the public housing where many of them live in Minnesota.

Is this the cultural diversity that America is seeking?

The article also reported that young Hmong men had begun many inner city gangs. Gang membership required the kidnapping and gang rape of Hmong girls. In 1998, seven girls in the St. Paul area were raped by these gangs, according to local

Why is the federal government bringing these kinds of people into America?

The Hmong practice polygamy. Hmong women bear an average of 9.5 children. Adult Hmong find it almost impossible to learn English because they have so few words in their language that are equivalents to English words. For example, there are no words in Hmong for such ordinary aspects of the American life as bank accounts, welfare, monogamy or income taxes.

Given all of these problems, it is not surprising that the Hmong are finding it very difficult to assimilate into the American life.

Americans should be concerned about the influx of immigrants who are so culturally diverse that assimilation into American culture is not like-

What multicultural or "diversity" values do the Hmong bring to America? Polygamy? Indoor animal sacrifice? A primitive culture that has been described as "frozen in time?"

The Hmong in Minnesota are not an isolated example of immigrants at odds with American culture. The vast majority of immigrants now coming into the U.S. are from Third World countries. They have no skills, they speak no English, and they share no cultural values with indigenous Americans.

By bringing in such huge numbers of culturally different people, the U.S. is on the path to what many now call "national suicide." Certainly, it is clear that American culture - the very culture that created this country - is under attack from all directions.

The Hmong are just one example of diversity run amok in America today. The examples are everywhere. In New York City, by 2020, one out of every two New Yorkers will be an ethnic minority, newly arrived from Third World countries.

California is now projected to have a minority majority population by 2005. That means Hispanics, most of them recent immigrants from Mexico, will become the new ethnic majority in the state.

This trend is occurring in Texas, Arizona and New Mexico as well. Many Mexican activists now talk

openly about the "reconquest" of these states in the Southwestern United States. They intend to make this area of the U.S. a part of Mexico.

In the name of diversity and multiculturalism, the U.S. is allowing the destruction of American culture by bringing into the country huge numbers of immigrants who share none of America's traditional cultural values.

And what are those values? We've almost forgotten them but American values, culture, laws and language are primarily English in origin. They include:

- · The habit of self reliance and local government;
- · The belief in natural rights, including the right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness (to borrow a phrase);
- · The English common law tradition and due process of law;
- · The principle in law against selfincrimination;

- dom from external controls:
- · The tradition of loyal opposition and the right to dissent;
  - · Freedom of speech;
- · The sense of fair play, of the tradition of honesty and fair dealing;
- · A rich tradition of voluntary associations and institutions.

The Hmong and many other Third World immigrants streaming into America today bring none of these values or traditions with them. In fact, many Third World immigrants to the U.S. are fleeing from countries where none of these values and beliefs have even been visible.

It's time to close the borders and move America away from its policy of mass immigration. But don't expect Al Gore or George W. Bush to mention the subject, much less propose to do anything about stopping the millions of immigrants who are pushing America down the path of cultural suicide.



## Black Confederates An Oxymoron? Maybe Not...

"My paramount object in this struggle is to save the Union, and is not either to save or destroy slavery. If I could save the Union without freeing any slave I would do it., and if I could save it by freeing all the slaves I would do it; and If I could save it by freeing some and leaving others alone I would also do that. What I do about slavery and the colored race I do because I believe it helps to save the Union; and what I forbear because I do not believe it would help save the Union." -Abraham Lincoln to newspaperman Horace Greely.

A debate is on in America over Black Civil War soldiers and whether they fought for the Confederacy. From Texas to North Caroline to Tennessee. to Washington D.C., the battle is being fought over proof, reason, and legitimacy of Black Confederates.

In an article written by Dan Sewell, "Black wore gray for Dixie," Emorson Emory, a 74 year-old Black psychiatrist of Dallas, Texas, and member of the "Sons of Confederate Veterans", and a descendent of a Black Confederate soldier, has challenged the belief that black soldiers only fought for the Union. In his attempts to honor black soldiers, Emory has written letter to the African-American Civil War Foundation, requesting the opportunity to pay tribute to African- Americans who served the Confed-

eracy. A historian from the foundation turned down Emory's request in a written statement explaining that the memorial was for soldiers who fought to end of the War in March of 1865, the Confederacy was organizing Black troops in Richmond, Virginia, but there are no records on whether they saw combat. However, at Randolph Community College in North Carolina, teachers of a class last fall were challenged by civil rights leaders for contending that there were black slaves who were loyal to the Confederacy. Like Emory, both teachers are members of the "Sons of Confederate Veterans."

Charles Kelly Barrow, a Zebulon, Georgia high school teacher, has done extensive research on Black Confederate Soldiers, and has written, "Forgotten Confederates", an anthology which includes civil war time news articles, obituaries, pension records, essays and documents, commented, "They're in opposition either way. Certain people have always tried to divide White and Black Southerners. " Barrow explained that there are many disbelieving African Americans when it comes to Black Confederate Soldiers, and there are white people who don't want to admit that Black people fought for the South.

In Kansas on August 21, 1998, a gathering and press conference took place on the steps of the Lincoln Monument at the Kansas State Capitol building in an effort to

honor Blacks who served the Confederacy. Members of the 9th Texas Infantry, CSA and the 1st Kansas Colored Infantry were present to honor Black people who served as Confederates in the War. The Envelope Commemorating Blacks Serving for the Confederacy was unveiled on the South Lawn of the Kansas Capitol Building to a multiracial audience, in an effort to honor the "Forgotten Confederates." There is controversy brewing over the filming of "The Angel of Marye's Heights" and "Morgan's Raiders" because Black Confederate soldiers have been written into the scripts.


Although many don't believe that Blacks could have fought for the Confederacy, the proof is out there... at Moorehouse College in Atlanta, Georgia. Graves Hall (the oldest building on campus, constructed in 1889), is where the battle of Atlanta was fought and is the burial place of Black Confederate Soldiers who are buried underneath the build-

The role the Black Union solider played in the Civil War was vital to the success of the Union Army. The Militia Act of July 17, 1862 authorized the enlistment of Blacks into the Army, although Black soldiers were fighting for the Union before the Militia Act, with a stipend of \$10.00 a month (regardless of rank), which was significantly less than the pay of a White Union soldier. At the start of the war, the Black solider was used for

"Fatigue Duty" or "Garrison Duty", and other undesirable jobs that White soldiers didn't want to be bothered with in order to free their time up for more important matters such as "combat".

As Whites in the North began to take notice of the passion and ardor of the Black Union Soldier, they came to the realization that Black Soldiers could be killed in war just as White soldiers. It is a misconception to many that Black Union Soldiers were treated fairly and with respect. They experienced unfair treatment, inferior pay, second hand uniforms and malfunctioning equipment that cost lives on the battle field, not to mention the fact that over 80 percent of all Union Soldiers executed for mutiny were African American.

The former slave fought for the Union to prove that he could be a part of society and earn his freedom. Historians estimate more than 150,000 black men served in the Union Army, fought in 41 major battles and 449 minor engagements. By the end of the war approximately 37,000 black soldiers died to restore the Union, which was in truth what the Civil War was about - not the freeing of slave. For White Americans, it was a war of restoring or succeeding from the Union, for the African-American people, it was a chance to prove their worth as citizens and their right to freedom...No matter what side they fought on.

## **Cooperative Education Program/ Delaware State University**

The Cooperative Education (Co-op) at Delaware State University is a program that allows students to combine formal academic study with periods of practical work experience in business, industry, government, or service organizations. Co-op gives students the opportunity to test their career interests in jobs generally related to the field of study they are pursuing. It provides students, who have defined career objectives, the forum to develop expertise and sharpen specific skills. For students who have not made a career choice, Co-op, with its temporary and varied assignments, provides an opportunity to explore options.

At Delaware State University, students participating in the Co-op program are considered full-time students, receive academic credit from the University, and are paid by the employer for experience gained on the job.

The Delaware State University Cooperative Education Program provides an opportunity for employers to observe prospective future employees. This program provides employers with a readymade, effective training and recruitment tool. Studies show that Cooperative Education students are more highly motivated and remain with their employers years longer than do students not involved with Cooperative Education.

There are two types of Co-op options at Delaware State University. The Alternating Option requires the student to alternate semesters between full-time work and full-time study (up to six months). The Parallel Option is similar to a part-time job. The student goes to school full-time and works about 20 hours per week each semester. Work periods for either option generally correspond to the University's academic calendar. Normally, co-op assignments are arranged as follows: Fall:September through December; Spring: January through May. Jobs requiring lengthy on the job training may be provided for through combining the summer term with either the fall or spring term, yielding a June through December or a January through August term.

A prospective Co-op student should have at least a 2.8 GPA, meet any preemployment requirements of the employer, and be a student in good standing at the University. All co-op placements must be approved by the academic department chair and the Cooperative Education coordinator in the Career Planning Office prior to the co-op expe-




In 1994 he contributed to a book titled, "Homage to Buno Domiani From His Loving Students and Various Friends a Fesschrift". Toscano wrote a

Dr. Toscano received his Master's Degree from the University of Delaware, and his Doctorate from the Catholic University of America in Washington, DC. In 1972 he joined the faculty of Delaware State University. Since then, he has distinguished himself as an author, lecturer and authority on the Latin and Hispanic cultures.

Currently, Toscano is working on a poetic interpretation of Sicily, where he will describe the civilization of the Italian country through his own eyes. He describes this inspiration as his "own personal daydream.'

### A Return to Greatness

In honor of Black History Month, the Student Government Association and the Delaware State University (DSU) chapter of the NAACP held a two-part ceremony entitled "The Celebration of Black Love." In Part Two of this ceremony on Monday, February 22nd, motivational speaker and NAACP member, Kalfani Ture visited DSU to speak on theme of Returning the African Mind to its Original Greatness. The event was held in the Student Center Auditorium. Ture, author of the forthcoming book, Six Ways off the Plantation, believes that history and knowledge of self are instrumental in helping the restoration of the African mind. "History is most important because there is a lack of it," Ture stated. "Regardless of Caribbean heredity, we are merican or Africans first."

"Knowing our history is the best way to pursue empowerment," he continued. Throughout his lecture, Ture chronicled the lives well known African-American predecessors. Among those mentioned were W.E.B. Dubois, the creator of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP); Mary Patton, the first woman of African descent to receive a Bachelor's degree in the United States; and Carter G. Woodson, author of Miseducation of the Negro. Woodson also created National Negro History Week, which later evolved into Black History Month.

Ture further emphasized the importance

of history by stating, "History determines our future and writes our past." He was able to cite the brilliance and contributions of Africans to society as well. He mentioned that history has recorded that civilization originated in Africa. Before Europeans colonized Africa, Africans created the game of chess, founded many universities throughout the West Coast of Africa and created a naval system. Ture also informed students that Egyptians created masonry, which not only started building construction but was contributory in the organizing of Pan-Hellenic organizations.

Once we have gained a proper knowledge of our history, we must gain a proper knowledge of ourselves," he said. He attributes the brain as a human's greatest asset as well as "God's greatest creation." "The human brain can hold over 22 million volumes of information. That means we can learn a lot about our past and still have space for future knowledge," he added.

Ture's personal goals for African-Ameri-

cans are for them to become more cognitive and to refrain from the use of derogative statements. "I would also like to see a resurgence of involvement in Greek fraternities and sororities and organizations such as the NAACP that help in the advancement of

our people," he continued.

"We are not a conquered people," Ture stated in closing. "Some of the strategies and tactics of yesterday may not work now but we as young people need to form new strate-

Please understand, true peace comes from within - not what kind of car you're pushing, the city you're representing or how many girls you f\*\*\*ing.


Seek wisdom. Let your internal light shine, material things last only a short while but knowledge and truth transcend time.

## The Ethiopian Jews Exhibit

The Delaware State University Art Center Gallery is hosting a photo exhibit of the original Jews in Ethiopia. June Porter, a DSU alumna and African American Hebrew Israelite-Historian brought the exhibit, entitled "The Jews of Ethiopia: The Last Glimpse of a 3,000 Year Old Community," to introduce Blacks to the long Biblical history of Black people. The exhibit, which can be seen in room 229 of the DSU library, contains the work of Joan Roth, a noted Jewish world traveler and photographer.

The Ethiopian Jews or Beta Israel, also known as the Falashas, are the only true descendents of the original twelve tribes of Israel. European Jewish historians have tried to disprove the authenticity of the Falashas who have an oral

history predating Christianity.

European Jews follow the Torah (first five books of the Bible) and a book called the Talmud (meaning study or learning). The Talmud is a written **interpretation** of the oral law, called the **Mishna**. The Mishna existed since the first century AD being collected by Rabbi Judah and Gemara. The comments of Rabbis from 200 to 500 AD are also included. The Ethiopian Jews do not follow the Talmud or accept its interpretations over the Law of Moses (Torah.) For this reason many of today's European Jews do not accept them as Rabbis or any type of religious official.

Roth's photographs depict the Falashas in traditional activities such as weaving fabrics with the same techniques used for generations, and making bread for the Sabbath. There is also a rare photo of a Qes (priest, in the Ge'ez language) displaying a 300 year old handwritten copy of the Torah. The Qes explained that everyone must fast three days then bathe in a river before touching, looking, or even glancing at the scripture.

The Ethiopian Jews exhibit will be displayed through April at DSU's main campus, and the Wilmington campus on 621 Market St. on the downtown mall free of charge.

Through her enthusiasm for spreading Black history, Porter also began researching the slave ship Henrietta Marie. The Henrietta Marie found in 1972 off the Florida Keys by Black treasure hunter Moe Molina, is the only known slave ship discovered in U.S. History.

The DSU library and Arts center will sponsor the showing of a one-hour video entitled; "Souls of Passage" discussing slavery and the Henrietta Marie. For information on the photo exhibit or the Henrietta Marie contact June Porter at (302) 739-4930 or the DSU library at (302) 739-5111.

and just think of the next steps is From how the current status of the world, to wanting to go home to see


my mommy Straight bugged out thoughts of being an evil scientist of having new plans




